1 (Time noted: 7:00 p.m.)

2 MR. BELNIAK: Good evening. Thanks for  
3 joining us. We're going to be starting at 7:05  
4 to get everyone settled in.

5 Once again, thanks for joining.

6 Thank you for joining us this evening.  
7 We're going to get started at about 7:05.  
8 We're just going to give people more time to  
9 filter in. We'll be starting shortly.

10 Thank you. If you're just joining us,  
11 good evening. Thanks for spending some time  
12 with us tonight. We're going to give it  
13 another minute or so to let people finish  
14 filtering in.

15 If you're just joining us, thank you.  
16 We're going get started at about 7:05 in just  
17 about one more minute. Just giving people a  
18 little more time to filter in.

19 Thank you.

20 Okay, we have about 7:05. Our join rate  
21 is flattening out. So, with that, I believe we  
22 can begin. I'd like to hand the meeting over  
23 to Pilar Patterson who will be our first  
24 speaker. She will kick off the meeting and get  
25 us going.

1 With that, Pilar.

2 MS. PATTERSON: Great.

3 MR. BELNIAK: Pilar, your audio was there  
4 and then it left.

5 MS. PATTERSON: -- which is proposed off  
6 the coast of New Jersey. I want to note that  
7 the time is now 7:05 and that marks the opening  
8 of tonight's public hearing.

9 Next slide.

10 Again, my name is Pilar Patterson and I'm  
11 the head of mid-Atlantic permitting for Ørsted.  
12 Our moderator for this evening is Alan Belniak  
13 from VHB Consulting and he has already been on  
14 the line and notifying us as to the start of  
15 this hearing tonight.

16 Following my introductory remarks, I'm  
17 going to ask Alan to review the format of  
18 taking comments both tonight as well as written  
19 comments which are accepted up until March 21,  
20 which is the close of the public comment  
21 period. Once Alan finishes these logistics,  
22 Ocean Wind will present a short PowerPoint  
23 that's going to describe the Green Acres  
24 diversion, which is the purpose about tonight's  
25 hearing.

1           In addition to myself, that PowerPoint  
2 presentation will also be given by David  
3 Hinchey, who is the Senior Manager of Major  
4 Permitting and Environmental Services for PSEG  
5 Renewables, who is partnering with Ørsted on  
6 the Ocean Wind 1 project; as well as  
7 Katharine Perry, the Ørsted permit manager for  
8 this project; and Tom Suthard, Ørsted's New  
9 Jersey Stakeholder Relations Manager.

10           At the conclusion of the PowerPoint  
11 presentation, Tom will invite Alan to once  
12 again review the process to give public comment  
13 and we will then open the hearing to the public  
14 comment portion.

15           At this point, I'm going to hand it back  
16 over to Alan to cover the logistics for  
17 tonight's hearing.

18           MR. BELNIAK: Thank you, Pilar.

19           So, we are using the Zoom webinar format  
20 for tonight's meeting, which means that at the  
21 start all participants will be muted during the  
22 slide show presentation. Following the  
23 presentation at the beginning of the public  
24 comment portion for tonight's hearing, there  
25 will be an opportunity to unmute, and I, as the

1 moderator, will take care of doing so so that  
2 you can present your public comment.

3 If you're participating via a computer and  
4 you wish to speak or submit a comment, you can  
5 indicate that you'd like to do so by raising  
6 your hand using the webinar controls in the  
7 bottom tray of Zoom. To raise your hand,  
8 simply click on the hand icon and that will  
9 send an indicator to me that you'd like to  
10 speak. If you'd prefer, you can also submit a  
11 text-based comment using the Q and A function  
12 inside the Zoom webinar and I'll read these  
13 comments into the record throughout the  
14 evening.

15 If you're participating by telephone, and  
16 right now we've got ten call-in listeners, you  
17 can use the star 9 command and that will raise  
18 your hand also similar to using the raise hand  
19 command here. And when the time is right, I'll  
20 take you off mute for you to share your  
21 comment.

22 We will be limiting the time for about  
23 3 minutes to give everyone a fair chance to  
24 speak their comments. When it is your turn,  
25 please state and spell your name for the

1 benefit of our court reporter.

2 You'll see a clock on our screen for those  
3 3 minutes for those of you that have the  
4 benefit of seeing the screen. For those on  
5 telephone, we'll call out when your time is  
6 nearly expired.

7 We do ask that commenters be respectful of  
8 the time limit to enable everyone a chance to  
9 speak. We do have over 170 people in the  
10 audience of total participants with hands  
11 raised and comments ready, so we want to make  
12 sure everyone has the opportunity.

13 We will be alternating between hands  
14 raised from telephone, hands raised inside  
15 Zoom, and typed comments as well.

16 One more item. Because we have an active  
17 group here, we want to make sure everyone who  
18 wishes to submit comments do so and has the  
19 opportunity. So, please do limit those  
20 comments to the proposed Green Acres diversion.  
21 You may also submit your written comments  
22 during the public comment period which ends on  
23 March 21, 2022 to Ocean Wind 1. A copy of your  
24 comments must also be sent to the Green Acres  
25 Program. The contact information for Ocean

1 Wind 1 and the Green Acres Program will be  
2 provided on the last slide of the presentation  
3 and also available in the outgoing chat for you  
4 to copy down. This information was also  
5 included in the public notice that can be found  
6 at Ocean Wind's website at [www.OceanWind.com](http://www.OceanWind.com).

7 Please make a note of the phone numbers on  
8 the screen in the event that you are  
9 disconnected with internet connectivity and  
10 need to dial in to listen.

11 This hearing is being recorded and its  
12 transcript will be prepared. A copy of the  
13 hearing transcript will be available as part of  
14 the Green Acres application. That will be  
15 submitted to the New Jersey Department of  
16 Environmental Protection Green Acres Program.

17 Please note that Ocean 1 will not provide  
18 responses to questions presented during the  
19 hearing, so everyone who wishes to make a  
20 comment has the ability to do so. Once the  
21 post hearing comment period ends on March 21,  
22 Ocean Wind will prepare and post a response to  
23 comments document during the post hearing  
24 comment period to the project website, again,  
25 [www.OceanWind.com](http://www.OceanWind.com).

1           With that, I'd like to hand it back to  
2           Pilar.

3           MS. PATTERSON: Thanks very much, Alan.

4           We're going repeat those instructions  
5           following this PowerPoint presentation and just  
6           prior to opening the public comment period, so  
7           you'll have another chance to go through those  
8           if you missed anything.

9           Now, the purpose of tonight's hearing is  
10          to describe a provided description of the Ocean  
11          Wind project which is requesting the diversion  
12          of the parkland as well as the description of  
13          the parkland itself.

14          And we understand that while tonight's  
15          hearing is limited to accepting comments  
16          specifically on the proposed parkland division,  
17          it may be beneficial to learn a little more  
18          about the project itself and this way to better  
19          understand how that parkland diversion fits  
20          into the bigger picture of the project.

21          We will also provide an explanation of the  
22          compelling public need that this project will  
23          fulfill. And, finally, we will present the  
24          alternative to the parkland diversion and the  
25          proposed compensation for the diversion. After



1 the presentation, we will then open the hearing  
2 for the public comments.

3 In this figure, you can see the wind farm  
4 area in light yellow with the blue border and  
5 that's Ocean Wind 1 wind farm area that's off  
6 the coast of southern New Jersey with the  
7 closest turbines approximately 15 miles from  
8 Atlantic City.

9 Ocean Wind was going to consist of up to  
10 98 turbines generating 1100 megawatts, which is  
11 sufficient to power over half a million homes  
12 and we are anticipating commercial operations  
13 by the end of 2024.

14 Ocean Wind is a joint venture with PSEG, a  
15 New Jersey-based diversified energy company  
16 with both state and regional experience.

17 Now, the project has two separate points  
18 of interconnection. In the upper part of the  
19 figure shown by a small red for is the Oyster  
20 Creek point of interconnection and that's in  
21 Lacy Township and further south is the BL  
22 England point of interconnection and that's  
23 located in upper township.

24 For tonight's hearing, we are focusing  
25 only on that shorter cable which is shown on

1 the bottom of the figure and specifically where  
2 it comes on shore in Ocean City, where it  
3 involves the less than 1 acre of Green Acres  
4 parkland diversion in Ocean City itself.

5 So, I do want to emphasize that the  
6 purpose of tonight's hearing and the public  
7 comments themselves should be focused  
8 specifically on the Green Acres diversion.

9 Thank you. I'm now going to turn the  
10 presentation over to David Hinchey from PSEG  
11 and he's going to provide some specific  
12 information on the activities planned in Ocean  
13 City.

14 Thank you.

15 MR. HINCHEY: Thank you, Pilar, and good  
16 evening, everyone. As Pilar mentioned, my name  
17 is David Hinchey. I am the senior manager of  
18 major permitting for PSEG renewables.

19 Because the parcels proposed for diversion  
20 will be crossed by horizontal direction drill  
21 method, I thought I would start out with the  
22 description of this method which is also  
23 referred to as HDD.

24 There are two areas in Ocean City that  
25 will require a Green Acres diversion. In both

1 of these areas, cables will be buried  
2 underground using insulation known as  
3 horizontal directional drilling or HDD. The  
4 HDD method is being proposed for the cable  
5 installation where it makes landfall in Ocean  
6 City at 35 Street and a second parcel in Ocean  
7 City where the cables cross below Peck Bay.

8 The schematic here shows a typical HDD set  
9 up that will be used make landfall and is  
10 similar to what will be set up and look like  
11 during the 35 Street landfall.

12 During the HDD process, a smaller diameter  
13 bore hole will be drilled and subsequently  
14 enlarged along the design drill path between  
15 the on-shore TJB, which stands for transition  
16 joint bay, and the offshore HDD platform.

17 Following the drilling, an HDD duct will  
18 be poked through the bore hole and finally the  
19 offshore cable will be pulled through the HDD  
20 duct and fused with the onshore cable in the  
21 TJB.

22 On this next slide, we're taking a closer  
23 look at the work that will be conducted inside  
24 Ocean City. Once the cable makes landfall at  
25 35th Street, work in Ocean City will mostly be

1 limited to public roads and rights-of-way.

2 We are planning to do the onshore  
3 construction in Ocean City outside of peak  
4 summer tourist season to limit impact for  
5 tourism, recreational opportunities, traffic,  
6 and residents. There will be no construction  
7 on the beach or in the Green Acres parcel along  
8 Roosevelt Road Boulevard, which we are  
9 proposing for a diversion. Following  
10 construction, the roads and all construction  
11 work will be restored to preexisting or better  
12 conditions. There will be no aboveground  
13 impacts except the manhole, which will be  
14 installed to access the transition joint bay.

15 Again, there will be no changes to use of  
16 the beach or the diverted parcels after  
17 construction.

18 Finally, there is no planned maintenance  
19 inside of the diverted parcels. In the event  
20 of maintenance is required, most likely it will  
21 take place within the TJB which will leave  
22 access via the manhole within the roadway.

23 With this, I am going to turn the  
24 presentation over now to Katharine Perry who  
25 will take you through more information on the

1 Green Acres diversion being proposed.

2 MS. PERRY: Thanks, Dave.

3 Good evening. My name is Katharine Perry.  
4 I'm the Ocean Wind 1 permit manager. I'm going  
5 to turn now to the purpose of the Green Acres  
6 diversion that's being proposed, and forgive me  
7 for this text-heavy slide we have here.

8 So, on February 3, 2022, Ocean Wind 1  
9 petitioned the New Jersey Board of Public  
10 Utilities under NJSA 48:3-87.1(f)(2) to acquire  
11 the permanent rights-of-way and easements which  
12 are needed to install the underground cables  
13 for the Ocean Wind 1 offshore wind project  
14 across the Green Acres encumbered parcels owned  
15 by Ocean City. Ocean Wind 1 will apply to the  
16 New Jersey Department of Environmental  
17 Protection or the NJ DEP and the New Jersey  
18 State House Commission for the diversion of a  
19 portion of Green Acres encumbered parcels owned  
20 by Ocean City in accordance with the Green  
21 Acres regulations. These can be found at  
22 N.J.A.C. 7:36-1.1.

23 For additional clarity, I just wanted to  
24 let everybody know the meaning of a diversion  
25 that's being used in this scoping hearing is to

1 use or allow the use of controlled parkland for  
2 purposes other than recreation and  
3 conservation.

4 This public scoping hearing is being held  
5 to obtain public comment on the proposed  
6 diversion of approximately .838 acres of Ocean  
7 City-owned parkland.

8 The law requires that Ocean Wind provide  
9 funds for the replacement of 3 times the total  
10 acreage to be diverted and compensate Ocean  
11 City for the value of the necessary easements.  
12 Previously, Ocean Wind offered Ocean City 10  
13 times the appraised value of the diverted  
14 parcels.

15 This slide provides a high-level overview  
16 of the proposed diversion areas that are  
17 located in Ocean City.

18 The figure on the right depicts the  
19 onshore BL England export cable route and  
20 circled in red are the proposed diversion areas  
21 in Ocean City.

22 Again, the total area we're proposing to  
23 divert is .838 acres. The .838 acres includes  
24 a .39-acre portion of block 611, lots 137 and  
25 145 and Block 3500, Lot 1, including a riparian

1 grant. Together, this comprises .38 acres.  
2 These parcels are identified in the red circled  
3 area in the lower right-hand side of the  
4 figure. Those are the beach landfall area.  
5 The remaining areas to be diverted include the  
6 .068-acre portion of Block 3350.01, Lot 17  
7 along Roosevelt Boulevard in the lower middle  
8 area of the figure.

9 So, this slide focuses in on the portion  
10 of beach parcels are proposed to be diverted  
11 east of 35th Street in Ocean City. Ocean Wind  
12 1 proposes to install the cable under the beach  
13 at 35 Street using the horizontal directional  
14 drill method, which Dave Hinchey described  
15 previously. The cable is shown in red on the  
16 right edge of the figure and travels west along  
17 the areas to be diverted which are shown in  
18 orange. The cable will be buried approximately  
19 50 feet below grade and there will be no  
20 aboveground impacts before, during, or after  
21 construction. The surface use at the beach  
22 will remain the same.

23 There is two parcels and riparian grant  
24 owned by Ocean City and shown in orange include  
25 Block 611.11, Lots 137 and 145, that's the .39

1        acres area, and then Block 3500, Lot 1  
2        including the riparian grant which is .38  
3        acres. Ocean Wind will be seeking a 30-foot  
4        wide permanent easement across these parcels  
5        and that subtotals .77 acres. The easement is  
6        going to be a subsurface or belowground  
7        non-exclusive easement. So, that means Ocean  
8        City obtains ownership of the parcels and  
9        public access to the beach remain undisturbed.

10        This next slide focuses in on the second  
11        area proposed for diversion which is shown in  
12        orange both in the larger overview image as  
13        well as in the inset or detail map in the upper  
14        right-hand corner of the figure. Ocean Wind  
15        proposes to install underground cables via  
16        horizontal direction drill under this parcel  
17        just north of Roosevelt Boulevard. Following  
18        construction, again, there will be no  
19        aboveground impact to the diverted area and the  
20        surface use will remain the same.

21        The parcel owned by Ocean City is Block  
22        3350.01, Lot 17, and the area proposed for  
23        diversion is .068 acres. Again, this is  
24        depicted clearly in the inset map in the upper  
25        right-hand corner of the figure.



1 Ocean Wind will be seeking, again, a  
2 30-foot wide permanent easement across this  
3 parcel, which subtotals .068 acres. This  
4 easement will be, again, a subsurface  
5 non-exclusive easement and Ocean City will  
6 retain ownership of the parcel and surface use  
7 will remain the same.

8 I'm going to turn our focus now to the  
9 compelling public need for the project.

10 As part of Ocean Wind 1's Green Acres  
11 diversion application, the project must  
12 demonstrate the compelling public need for the  
13 diversion. On June 21, 2019, the New Jersey  
14 board of public utilities selected Ocean Wind 1  
15 to deliver a minimum of 1100 megawatts of  
16 offshore wind resources. This can be found at  
17 NJBPU Docket Number Q018121289, in order to  
18 fulfill the requirements of the requirements of  
19 the State's Offshore Wind Economic Development  
20 Act.

21 The project will also contribute to the  
22 objectives which are outlined at Executive  
23 Order 8 from 2018, which set a goal of  
24 obtaining 3500 megawatts of renewable energy by  
25 2030 as well as Executive Order 92, which in

1 November of 2019 increased the goal to 7500  
2 megawatts by 2035. By providing 1100 megawatts  
3 of renewable offshore wind energy, the project  
4 helped fulfill the requirements of both the  
5 Offshore Wind Economic Development Act as well  
6 as Executive Order 892 and thereby satisfies  
7 the compelling public need.

8 Turning focus now to the alternative that  
9 Ocean Wind 1 has identified and evaluated the  
10 proposed diversion, the project has identified  
11 the following:

12 First and foremost, the no action  
13 alternative in which Ocean Wind would not  
14 construct the project. This alternative is not  
15 feasible because it would not fulfill the  
16 compelling public need established by the BPU  
17 order and executive orders described on the  
18 prior slide.

19 The second alternative evaluated is a  
20 construction alternative to the proposed  
21 installation method of horizontal directional  
22 drill, which we described previously. Under  
23 this alternative for the HDD method, we would  
24 use the open cut construction method in which a  
25 trench would be excavated along the surface of

1 the diverted parcels in which the cable would  
2 be laid and then backfilled. This open cut  
3 installation method would result in greater  
4 environmental and surface impacts, and was  
5 therefore not carried forward by the project.

6 Finally, Ocean Wind 1 identified a number  
7 of landfall and ground alternatives which are  
8 described further on the following slides. I'm  
9 going to get into those now.

10 Ocean Wind 1 identified several  
11 alternatives to the proposed landfall at 35  
12 Street. The first alternative would make  
13 landfall with the cable at 34 Street. This  
14 alternative was not carried forward because the  
15 presence of a public restroom could conflict  
16 with the HDD work space required and the  
17 underground cabling. The next alternative  
18 includes the Fifth Street and 13 Street  
19 alternatives. These would require longer  
20 onshore routes along West Ave. resulting in  
21 increased traffic impacts. These alternatives  
22 would also affect Green Acres beach lots owned  
23 by Ocean City and were, therefore, not carried  
24 forward.

25 Finally, Ocean Wind identified an

1 alternative at 35 Street, which would entail  
2 placing a cable in the adjacent privately owned  
3 parcels identified as Block 611.11, Lots 126  
4 and 136. However, this parcel was unavailable  
5 and was, therefore, not carried forward as an  
6 alternative.

7 In accordance with the Green Acres  
8 regulations, as just discussed, there is no  
9 feasible, reasonable, or available alternative  
10 landfall location to the proposed landfall at  
11 35 Street across the Ocean City-owned parcels.

12 Turning now towards the Roosevelt  
13 Boulevard Bridge Crossing, Ocean Wind  
14 identified a number of alternatives to the  
15 posed Roosevelt Boulevard Crossing. The first  
16 alternative is depicted in the purple line at  
17 it crosses Peck Bay south of the Roosevelt  
18 Boulevard Bridge with HDD entry points within  
19 Nautilus Drive. This alternative would be  
20 longer than the proposed route. It would  
21 require multiple crossings of Roosevelt  
22 Boulevard and would be immediately adjacent to  
23 the residential development resulting in  
24 greater impacts to residents. Additionally,  
25 the crossing would require an increased curve

1 of the HDD which prevents greater technical  
2 risks. The second alternative is shown in the  
3 green line and this crosses Peck Bay south of  
4 the Roosevelt Boulevard Bridge with HDD entry  
5 points within a parking lot at the end of  
6 Nautilus Drive. While this alternative would  
7 be longer than the proposed route, the Ocean  
8 Wind 1 project is continuing to evaluate this  
9 alternative technical feasibility.

10 Finally, the third alternative is shown in  
11 red and would involve the export cable being  
12 attached to the Roosevelt Boulevard Bridge.  
13 This alternative was not carried forward as  
14 it's not available to the project.

15 In accordance with Green Acres  
16 regulations, other than alternative 2, there is  
17 no feasible, reasonable, and available  
18 alternative route to the proposed route.

19 I'm now going to discuss the compensation  
20 for these parcels which under the law, N.J.S.A.  
21 48:3-87.1(f)(2), Ocean Wind 1 would be required  
22 TO provide the following: One, provide funds  
23 for the acquisition of three times the area  
24 proposed for diversion for additional land for  
25 recreation conservation purposes within Cape

1 May County. These funds can be provided to the  
2 NJ DEP, to the Green Acres program, a local  
3 government unit, or a qualifying tax-exempt  
4 nonprofit organization. Since the total area  
5 for the diversion is .838 acres, Ocean Wind  
6 would need to provide funds for the acquisition  
7 of 2.514 acres of property in Cape May County.  
8 Additionally, Ocean Wind will compensate Ocean  
9 City for the fair market value of the  
10 easements. Ocean Wind 1 has previously offered  
11 Ocean City 10 times the appraised value of the  
12 parcels.

13 With that, I'm going to now turn the  
14 presentation over to Tom Suthard who is going  
15 to discuss how to submit written comments  
16 following tonight's hearing.

17 Take it away, Tom.

18 MR. SUTHARD: Good evening, I'm Tom  
19 Suthard, New Jersey Stakeholder Relations  
20 Manager, and I'm going to share with you some  
21 procedural information and next steps. We will  
22 also put the following information in the chat.

23 You may provide written comments on the  
24 proposed Green Acres diversion no later than

7 Ocean Wind 1 in the subject line. Please note  
8 that e-mail comments are preferred but comment  
9 may also be mailed to the New Jersey Department  
10 of Environmental Protection, Green Acres  
11 program, Bureau of Legal Services and  
12 Stewardship, 401 East State Street, 7th Floor,  
13 Mail Code 401-07B, P.O. Box 420, Trenton, New  
14 Jersey 08625-0420 Attention: Ocean Wind  
15 Application.

16 Additionally, information on the project  
17 is available at [www.OceanWind.com](http://www.OceanWind.com).

18 This PowerPoint presentation will be  
19 posted on our website tomorrow. We are at the  
20 end of our PowerPoint presentation, but we'll  
21 soon welcome your comments on the proposed  
22 Green Acres diversion in Ocean City.

23 I'm now going to ask Alan to quickly  
24 review how you may share your comment and then  
25 the floor will be open for your comment.

1 Alan, next slide.

2 MR. BELNIAK: Thanks, everyone. Once  
3 again, my name is Alan Belniak and I'm here to  
4 moderate the comment portion of tonight's  
5 presentation. As a reminder, this meeting is  
6 being recorded and transcribed. If you're  
7 planning to provide comments tonight, we ask  
8 you once again to limit your comments to 3  
9 minutes to provide all those who wish to  
10 provide comment the opportunity to do so.

11 Once again, to provide comment during this  
12 scoping meeting, you have two options. If  
13 you're at a computer, you can your raise hand  
14 button below. You can also press star 9 if  
15 you're on the telephone. Both of those are the  
16 raise hand function and indicate to me that  
17 you'd like to express a verbal comment. We  
18 would then selectively unmute you. You have  
19 the opportunity -- your 3 minutes to share your  
20 comment, and we'll enter it into the record.

21 You may also submit your comments through  
22 the Q and A function down below. You simply  
23 tap that, enter your comment, and press enter,  
24 and it gets submitted to us in text form.

25 Regardless of the format, please state



1 your name and clearly spell your last name for  
2 the benefit of the court reporter. We do have  
3 some folks here in Zoom who are just using a  
4 first name or something like so I may ask you  
5 to clarify your name.

6 On behalf of the whole Ocean Wind 1  
7 project team here and the extended team, thank  
8 you again very much for attending tonight's  
9 meeting and I will now open the floor for  
10 public comment.

11 Just before we start, to give everyone  
12 some context at 7:32 p.m., we have 199 people  
13 in attendance, of those 8 people are calling in  
14 on the telephone. At this moment, we have six  
15 hands raised and we have nine items in the Q  
16 and A. I will share what those numbers look  
17 like periodically as we go throughout so you'll  
18 have a sense of what the comment queue is  
19 looking like.

20 I will alternate roughly back and forth  
21 between text-based comments, and telephone  
22 comments, and hand raises as well. I'm going  
23 to start with a few text-based comments because  
24 the two of them go together and then I will  
25 take my first telephone comment or my

1 firsthand -- excuse me. The firsthand raise,  
2 just to get you ready, is going to be Suzan  
3 Hornick and after that will be Nathan  
4 Brightbill. In just a moment, I'll call you to  
5 take yourself off mute. Right now, I will go  
6 into the first text-based comment and that is  
7 from Robert Moss. And Robert comments: I  
8 don't believe participants being muted meets  
9 the regulatory requirements for a scoping  
10 meeting. Meanwhile, I will have comments I  
11 anticipate making. Robert then followed up  
12 with okay, it was just announced that people  
13 can be unmuted during the comments period.

14 Greg Cudnik commented did you just say 10  
15 call-in listeners? A moment ago I just shared  
16 what the current status was at the moment.

17 With that, I'm going move over to our  
18 first raised hand.

19 Suzan, I'm going to send the command for  
20 you to unmute your line, and when you do that,  
21 the floor will be yours. And let me pull up my  
22 timer.

23 All right, Suzan, I believe we can hear  
24 you.

25 MS. HORNICK: Let me begin by saying that

1 I am the representative of Protect Our Coast  
2 NJ, and our group, although centered in Ocean  
3 City, is inclusive of other areas as well.

4 We do not want any part of this project.  
5 The reasonable, feasible, alternatives to  
6 landfall would be no landfall.

7 It's disgusting to me that our New Jersey  
8 Assembly and Senate were willing to write new  
9 laws taking away our rights without any  
10 meaningful public comment in just a few days.  
11 Then, Governor Murphy quickly gave our rights  
12 aware to a foreign country and a foreign  
13 company because Ørsted told him to. That's  
14 un-American and a complete abuse of power.

15 The BPU's mission statement is, and I  
16 quote, to ensure the safe, adequate, and proper  
17 utility services are provided at reasonable  
18 nondiscriminatory rates to all members of the  
19 public who desire such services to develop and  
20 regulate a competitive, economical,  
21 cost-effective energy policy that promotes  
22 responsible growth and clean renewable energy  
23 sources while maintaining a high quality of  
24 life in New Jersey.

25 These cable bundles as well as the

1 turbines are absolutely not safe. For one  
2 thing, in this case, they emit EMS, which has  
3 been linked to several types of cancers,  
4 miscarriages, dementia, and more. Nobody is  
5 studying the cumulative effects of the  
6 additional radiation emitted by these cables  
7 with all the 4 and 5G notes recently installed  
8 here, the EMS of our overhead power lines, and  
9 all the other emissions that we have.

10 In addition, this entire plan of 7 lease  
11 areas still with nearly 1,000 gigantic turbines  
12 is experimental. No company has ever built  
13 them this high or this wide. We, in Ocean  
14 City, are not your guinea pigs and our children  
15 are not going to be collateral damage. They're  
16 only supplemental energy supplies and certainly  
17 not adequate. They are more expensive than  
18 most -- than all other energy options at this  
19 point.

20 We demand extensive scientific local  
21 environmental impact studies be done prior to  
22 putting anything in the sea or on land. It's  
23 abundantly clear to me that the BPU and  
24 President Joseph whatever his last name is, are  
25 biased in favor of Ørsted and not in any way

1 looking out for the best interest of the people  
2 of Ocean City or New Jersey as evidenced by the  
3 silver lapel pin depicting a turbine he often  
4 wears, which I suspect was a gift from Ørsted.

5 We are a very small island and the  
6 proposed area in which Ørsted wants to lay the  
7 cable is a very densely-packed residential area  
8 with a few small stores. The only thing we  
9 have in Ocean City to support our community and  
10 our quality of life is tourism. I imagine  
11 millions of people come to the beach between  
12 34 to 36 Street between April and October. We  
13 cannot risk the health and welfare of our  
14 visitors, friends, and family, as well as the  
15 much endangered species in our ocean and bay  
16 because it's more convenient for Ørsted lay  
17 their cables there than to actually go around  
18 our island.

19 MR. BELNIAK: I just want to let you know,  
20 you're at 3 minutes if you could please wrap it  
21 up.

22 MS. HORNICK: Yup.

23 We cannot afford to give up any beach or  
24 land for this. I hope the BPU will not approve  
25 this. If you do, we will know you are putting

1 the greed of New Jersey politicians over the  
2 lives of New Jersey's people.

3 Thank you.

4 MR. BELNIAK: Thank you for that, Suzan.

5 MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comment.

6 Alan, please move on to the next  
7 participant.

8 MR. BELNIAK: The next participant --  
9 first, next up is Nathan Brightbill. On deck  
10 is Kim, no last name given, and on deck after  
11 that is Ed.

12 Nathan Brightbill, you should have the  
13 command to your device to unmute your line or  
14 your mic. With that, you have 3 minutes to  
15 make your comment.

16 MR. BRIGHTBILL: This is Nathan  
17 Brightbill. I wanted to say a few things.

18 I was at the last public meeting there on  
19 the boardwalk. It seems like most of the  
20 prop5, especially these younger, people some  
21 older too, are so worried about they call it  
22 claimant change and they even seem scared. And  
23 I think they have been duped into this thing.  
24 It's like a religion for a lot of people. A  
25 lot of the younger people don't even remember

1 Al Gore, which he made all these predictions  
2 back in the '90s that none of it came true. He  
3 tried to scare people with all these  
4 predictions, which never came true. And he  
5 made billions of dollars.

6 It seems like a lot of this stuff is all  
7 about money. It makes a lot of people scared  
8 that aren't really knowledgeable and don't do  
9 any research. They don't do any critical  
10 thinking on both sides.

11 And I want to recommend a couple of books.  
12 The best one is called Green Fraud by Marc  
13 Morano. Apocalypse Never is a pretty good book  
14 too by Michael Shellenberger.

15 I just want people to know that if the  
16 earth is truly warm, it's not manmade. I don't  
17 know how many people think that there's a --  
18 the climate is just going to stay the same year  
19 after year for decades and centuries, it's  
20 always going to be changing. That's why when  
21 it came over, it was called global warming,  
22 then all of the scientists said it was  
23 debunked, so what do they call it? Climate  
24 change. Well, we could use climate change for  
25 anything. So, that is the main thing.

1           People have to realize that this is like a  
2 religion to a lot of people and it's not  
3 working over in Europe. Electricity bills are  
4 doubling and tripling, which hurts a lot of the  
5 elderly and it really hurts a lot of people,  
6 period.

7           If you see what's going on right now with  
8 the federal government and Joe Biden's  
9 administration blaming all these gas prices on  
10 the Ukraine war, it's because right when he got  
11 into office he declared war on fossil fuels,  
12 and that's the problem. We have the best  
13 intelligence and the best ways of doing things  
14 that are so efficient and cost effective for  
15 people.

16           MR. BELNIAK: We're at about 3 minutes.

17           MR. BRIGHTBILL: I want to say one quick  
18 thing though. I want people to go out to the  
19 boardwalk in Ocean City, look out into the  
20 ocean. God created that. God does not want us  
21 bringing tons of stinking windmills out there  
22 for no reason. It's almost immoral what they  
23 want to do. So, reject it, it's a big waste,  
24 and if they get this through, it's going to  
25 keep going and going. Don't think that it's



1 just going to stop there. They will keep going  
2 all up through the east coast.

3 Thank you very much.

4 MS. PERRY: Thanks your comment.

5 Alan, next comment, please.

6 MR. BELNIAK: I'm going to take one  
7 comment in the Q and A because I think it  
8 applies to everyone here. The comment is from  
9 Maddie, no last name given. And Maddie  
10 comments could people please spell their last  
11 names. Maddie is coming from OCNJdaily.com.

12 MS. PERRY: Sorry, Alan.

13 I just want to thank Maddie for that  
14 comment.

15 I just want to provide a quick reminder.  
16 So, for tonight's hearing, we are focusing only  
17 on the proposed Green Acres parkland diversion  
18 in Ocean City. So, please do try to focus your  
19 comments specifically on the Green Acres  
20 diversion.

21 Alan, you can go ahead and introduce the  
22 commenter.

23 MR. BELNIAK: Coming up next is Tim and  
24 then on deck is Ed.

25 Tim, I'm going to send a command. Please

1 state your full first and last name for the  
2 court reporter.

3 MR. FLYNN: Tim Flynn.

4 I want to thank the other two people that  
5 have commented so far. I tend to agree with  
6 pretty much everything they said. I don't  
7 think that we have had the environmental  
8 studies for Ocean City and the ocean as a whole  
9 offshore. I mean, if we're only talking about  
10 the Green Acres portion, that wouldn't happen  
11 if we didn't build the offshore portion. So,  
12 if we were to decide not to do the offshore,  
13 then we wouldn't even have to worry about the  
14 Green Acres portion.

15 There's a lot of risks posed by the wind  
16 turbines offshore as well to migratory birds,  
17 fish, wildlife. There's nothing that's been  
18 mentioned on studies that have been done about  
19 things that could leak from the wind turbines,  
20 any environmental impact.

21 We have a history of hurricanes in this  
22 area. Is there any studies that are done when  
23 the hurricanes that could hit this area and  
24 then flood the cables out under the soil  
25 onshore or damage the turbines offshore. What

1 would the impact be on that?

2 It seems that this is almost a done deal  
3 and we haven't really had room for comment or  
4 anything like that. It seems like this is just  
5 being pushed on Ocean City.

6 I could also say that -- I think it was  
7 Suzan who mentioned, why do we have to have  
8 this come onshore? We have inlets. Why don't  
9 we put it right through the inlet? If we're  
10 going to do it, why does it have to go onshore?  
11 Why dig up our shorelines? Why is it going to  
12 go to people's right next to their yards  
13 really? And they say there won't be much of an  
14 impact because it's 50 feet underground.  
15 Construction really tends to take a lot longer  
16 than anticipated for the most part. Maybe  
17 there won't be an impact once it's built, but  
18 it'll take 20 years to build this because there  
19 will be delays, and issues, and any times  
20 there's construction on the island, there's  
21 issues. Look at any construction that's  
22 happened on the island. So, that seems to be  
23 an issue.

24 I can wrap up here.

25 I could say that I'm very much opposed to

1 this whole project and I think I speak for a  
2 lot of Ocean City from what I've seen and heard  
3 and just the other people on this call. I  
4 think this is not going to be the end of people  
5 protesting this project. I really hope that  
6 Governor Murphy figures out, and sees what's  
7 going on, and decides to cut funding for this  
8 project, and hopefully Ocean City doesn't go  
9 through with this. No matter what, Ocean Wind  
10 1 is going to offer to this land value, the  
11 island will be forever changed by this project  
12 and hopefully this isn't going through.

13 With that, I'll wrap up.

14 Thank you.

15 MS. PERRY: Thanks, Tim.

16 Alan, next comment, please.

17 MR. BELNIAK: Next up is Ed.

18 And, Ed, I'm going to send the command for  
19 you to unmute your line. Just as before, if  
20 you could state your full first and last name  
21 for the court reporter, that would be  
22 appreciated.

23 Thank you.

24 MR. FINKELSTEIN: My name is Ed  
25 Finkelstein.

1 I haven't heard anything about our views  
2 on 33 Street. I haven't heard anything about  
3 noise that may be generated by this project. I  
4 haven't heard anything about the view of these  
5 possible turbines that are sitting out there in  
6 the ocean. And, foremost, they talk about  
7 burying the cable 50 feet, obviously,  
8 therefore, you're concerned about emissions,  
9 and I haven't heard anything about emissions  
10 that may come from these lines.

11 But I don't understand how you can have  
12 public comments on a project that's not fully  
13 described and vetted to begin with. That's  
14 really all that I have to add.

15 I have a property on the 3800 block of  
16 Central. That town is only 2 and a half blocks  
17 away. So, I'll obviously be impacted by this  
18 project and I don't think you've made a full  
19 presentation to us that present sufficient  
20 facts that we can discuss the pros and cons of  
21 the project. A lot more has to be done.

22 Thank you.

23 MS. PERRY: Thank you so much for your  
24 comment, Ed.

25 Alan, next commenter, please.

1 MR. BELNIAK: Sure. I'll it over to a  
2 text-based comment at the moment. That  
3 text-comment is from Cathy. Actually, they're  
4 back to back. I'm guessing she must've pressed  
5 enter, so I'll read them together.

6 The first part of the comment from Cathy  
7 is what do the blocks and lots equate to on the  
8 street map? The second comment is what streets  
9 are they? Those are two comments from Cathy.

10 MS. PERRY: Thanks, Cathy.

11 I'll just note here that that information  
12 was in the presentation and it will be on the  
13 presentation that's posted online.

14 MR. BELNIAK: Going to take one more  
15 text-based comment before we go back to a  
16 raised hand.

17 Another text-based comes from is Larry  
18 Tusliszewski. Larry comments what are  
19 appraised values of the easements?

20 With that, I will go to another hand  
21 raised. If you're reading any prepared  
22 comments as I think we had someone else before,  
23 if you could just please read them slowly  
24 because we do have a court reporter.

25 With that, Greg.

1 MR. CUDNIK: Gregory Graham Cudnik; I'm  
2 fully opposed to this project and what's being  
3 put forth here this evening.

4 There's really no compelling need. The  
5 project is not solving climate change, is not  
6 solving sea level rise. What it's doing is  
7 actually putting a community and ocean in grave  
8 jeopardy. This is all really being forced on  
9 us by executive order. And it's fully  
10 government overreach like our wind farms owned  
11 by Ørsted.

12 We have Ørsted representatives here  
13 tonight. Glad to hear all their stories about  
14 their success, however, there's many, many  
15 documented failures one after the other. I've  
16 got 2 minutes and 25 seconds left. There's not  
17 nearly enough time to touch on 1, 2, or even 3  
18 of them. It's an utter failure. If you're  
19 going to go forward with it, great, you're  
20 already on point; if not, read up, research,  
21 Google is your best friend --

22 (Inaudible.)

23 -- wind farms utter failure. You've  
24 shown --

25 (Inaudible.)

1           -- very much angry what's taking place in  
2 this meeting and what's taking place in the  
3 past. I'm not a resident there. I'm not a  
4 resident of Ocean City. I live on Long Beach  
5 Island but I can tell you a local gas meter  
6 project, horizontal drilling, that's failed  
7 three times on my block. I'm a proponent of  
8 natural gas. I believe it is the best source  
9 of energy right now that we have. That will  
10 probably be the way that we balance out this  
11 disaster we call wind energy that's coming.  
12 Small nuclear reactors and fusion will be  
13 filling those gaps as well.

14           This must not be approved. There's no  
15 action that needs to take place. There's no  
16 compelling need. The public did not vote for  
17 this. Once again, this is being forced by  
18 executive order that's already been described  
19 here tonight.

20           I agree with many of the things have  
21 already been stated before by many of these  
22 other presenters. I appreciate everyone coming  
23 out tonight. I'll say it's pathetic there's  
24 only 100 people on this call, it should be 500,  
25 or 1,000, or more. Most people have a clue



1 what's taking place. Those people are coming  
2 out and listening. Hopefully, you will listen  
3 up to the other people who speak tonight and  
4 dive in and research more about these topics.  
5 There's so many things I could talk about from  
6 the risks to the wildlife, risks to  
7 communities, it just goes on, and on, and on.

8 I encourage you to check out  
9 ProtectOurCoastNJ.com. Your donation of \$1,  
10 \$10, \$1,000 is greatly appreciated.

11 (Inaudible.)

12 -- to move forward with a suit. The Town  
13 of Ocean City does not sue someone. There's  
14 already been lawsuits moving forward in my  
15 local town of Long Beach Island by Save LBI,  
16 which is one of the town's organizations.  
17 Protect Our Coast is also working to try to  
18 stop these as best as possible.

19 I appreciate everyone coming out and  
20 listening. With 9 seconds left to go, I want  
21 to say thank you all for listening and just  
22 basically call a spade a spade, and do your  
23 research, and get out there, and make your  
24 voices heard, and do everything you can stop  
25 this utter failure before we're looking back at

1           this 10, 20 years from now saying man what did  
2           we actually fall into? This is an ugly snake  
3           pit called wind.

4           MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comments.  
5           Alan, please present the next commenter.

6           MR. BELNIAK: I'd like to recognize Robert  
7           Moss.

8           Robert, I'm going to send the command for  
9           you to unmute your mic.

10           With that, you've got 3 minutes with us  
11           here this evening to share your comment or  
12           comments.

13           MR. MOSS: Did I get through?

14           MR. BELNIAK: Yes, you did.

15           MR. MOSS: I actually don't have anything  
16           different to say than what I've put in my text  
17           messages. You might probably want to skip any  
18           of them. I'd like people to hear -- you know  
19           what I mean, not text messages, but the thing  
20           on the screen here -- this project -- just a  
21           couple things. There's no compelling need  
22           here. The regulations are very clear. A  
23           compelling need requires that there be a -- it  
24           has to be a project that mitigating a hazard to  
25           the public health, safety, or welfare that's in

1 the regulations 7:36-261D1i. Quite honestly,  
2 this project could get in under the next one  
3 ii, but it's important because the applicants  
4 in these diversions -- I've been following them  
5 since 2010. The applicants in these  
6 diversions, and the Green Acres staff, and the  
7 court, are toting towards the applicants and  
8 they're just careless in their applications.  
9 They'll say anything without regards to the  
10 facts. It reflects an attitude they know  
11 they're going to get what they want.

12 Now, we have people working to tighten up  
13 the regulation laws. We're just getting  
14 started, unfortunately. That's what we're  
15 seeing here again. The other thing I'll  
16 quickly ask, I heard the number a couple times,  
17 10 times the appraised value. Why is nobody --  
18 why were no private parcels considered for this  
19 project instead of public, supposedly protected  
20 forever, beach. If they're paying 10 times the  
21 appraised value for the lease, or whatever, for  
22 the easement, I guess, everything was going too  
23 fast for me, but 10 times the appraised value.  
24 This can be done on private property. An  
25 eminent domain can be used. What they're

1 doing, for whatever reason, they think the  
2 public land is the easiest to use, and they're  
3 going to grant that, and it's going to be gone.  
4 And this has been happening for -- at a fast  
5 pace for the last 12 years or so. It's going  
6 to keep happening until we have no public open  
7 space.

8 This thing should go back to square one  
9 and be designed if it's going to be built at  
10 all in deference to -- I know a lot of people  
11 here are much more hot about it than I am --  
12 but it's going to be done at all, there's no  
13 reason to use Green Acres land. I was looking  
14 at the map. I'm new to this. I don't live in  
15 Ocean City but I do follow Green Acres  
16 diversions around the state and this has got  
17 all the same characteristics. Use of private  
18 land is a reasonable alternative and should be  
19 considered.

20 Thank you.

21 MS. PERRY: Robert, thank you very much  
22 for your comment.

23 Alan, move on to the next commenter,  
24 please.

25 MR. BELNIAK: Certainly. Just, again, for

1 a point of order to let people know, we do have  
2 198 people in attendance. We have of those 8  
3 are using a telephone. I do see 6 raised hands  
4 and right now 12 comments in the Q and A as  
5 Robert alluded to a moment ago, some of which  
6 are his. Some also are people who have also  
7 commented as well.

8 We're going to endeavor to get people who  
9 have not commented yet in either format first.  
10 I just want to let you all know that we do see  
11 your comments coming in for sure.

12 The -- next, we'll do a text-based  
13 comment. That text-based comment is there's no  
14 actual name given. It's simply from no  
15 windmills. And that comment is: For the  
16 record, will the windmills be visible from the  
17 Ocean City beach/shoreline? I apologize.  
18 There is a name given, Patrick McCowen, Ocean  
19 City homeowner.

20 Next, we'll go back to a raised hand. The  
21 next hand raised I see is Shawn Raymond.

22 MR. RAYMOND: I will keep my comments to  
23 the subject at hand which is the Green Acres  
24 diversion and the land required for that. I do  
25 also want to thank the team hosting this call

1 for your patience and apologize for some of the  
2 harsh and conservatorial comments that you're  
3 receiving.

4 The one point I would just like to make as  
5 someone who has spent a great deal of my life  
6 in this town is that there's a ton of  
7 infrastructure including electricity  
8 infrastructure already in our sightlines that  
9 we take very little note of. It's basically  
10 part of our day to day lives. We looked down  
11 34 Street and we see tremendous electricity  
12 lines. We see parking lots, enormous grocery  
13 stores. I think you said it was about a 25- or  
14 30-foot wide line that you'll be developing  
15 entirely underground. I think it's very  
16 insincere or even dishonest to accuse Ørsted of  
17 destroying sightlines or valuable real estate  
18 and property when in all likelihood this is  
19 going to be almost invisible to the naked eye.

20 I support the project. I'm grateful for  
21 your work on this. I would encourage the  
22 skeptics or outright opponents to be a little  
23 more honest in what, if anything, this will add  
24 to their view compared to their day-to-day  
25 lives already.

1 MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comment,  
2 Shawn.

3 Alan, next comment please.

4 MR. BELNIAK: Next is Marcus Sibley. On  
5 deck is Kathy and then after that we will flip  
6 to text-based comments.

7 With that, Marcus Sibley, you should have  
8 a command to open your line. And once you do,  
9 I'll give you a fresh 3 minutes. Just as  
10 before, looking forward to hearing you state  
11 your name for the court reporter and keeping  
12 your comments pertaining to the diversion  
13 project.

14 MR. SIBLEY: I'm the Environmental Climate  
15 Justice Chairman for the New Jersey NAACP.

16 I just wanted to weigh in really quickly.  
17 I really appreciated all the different comments  
18 from all the representatives thus far.

19 I just want to point out three things that  
20 are really important that I think the developer  
21 needs to pay attention to; optics, economics,  
22 and inconvenience.

23 I think the optics are important. People  
24 have been coming to the beach or area their  
25 entire lives and they're afraid something that

1 has nostalgia is going to be impacted. I think  
2 it's important for the developer to make it  
3 very clear. To clear up any misconception that  
4 there may be about what's going to come with  
5 the project, I think that the onus is on the  
6 developer to make that apparent.

7 Economics, the jobs, what is the  
8 information, more transparency about the jobs.  
9 Will they be long term? Short term? What are  
10 the qualifications? I think that's important.

11 Number 3, inconvenience, being very  
12 clearly with people about how long the project  
13 will take, what is the accurate space that's  
14 going to be required and time that's going to  
15 be required. Some person spoke to the sound.  
16 I think it's important -- it's incumbent upon  
17 the developer. I understand you want to focus  
18 on this particular issue, but at the end of the  
19 day people are curious in general what does  
20 that project entail.

21 The other piece of it is I think there  
22 needs to be a lot of information, a lot more  
23 education because I've heard claims tonight  
24 that completely contradict information that I  
25 get on a daily basis. And what I'm not going



1 to do, I'm not going to call out people. I'm  
2 going to encourage the developer to make  
3 information is readily available because I  
4 heard many claims tonight that were just simply  
5 not true.

6 One thing I will point out, climate change  
7 is real, regardless how you feel about it. It  
8 is real. We have many examples showing that  
9 climate change is real. It's impacting our  
10 shorelines; it's impacting our sea level. It  
11 impacts everything.

12 So, regardless of how you feel about it, I  
13 think it's important we provide more education.  
14 So, people have the opportunity to get things  
15 that they didn't hear even if it isn't  
16 comfortable, I think it's important that the  
17 information is available. Again, I think it's  
18 incumbent upon the developer to make sure that  
19 information is out there because people are  
20 legitimately nervous and help people understand  
21 that if this is something you're doing, show  
22 people why it matters, not just for the people  
23 on the shore, show why would it should matter  
24 for people, Black people, Brown people across  
25 the state, why should they care about it? So,

1           what efforts are you making to make sure  
2           everyone knows why this is something that they  
3           should be paying attention to.

4           I just want to make sure both sides have  
5           an opportunity to be heard and making sure that  
6           people realize that this is important because  
7           if you don't provide the education, people only  
8           have to go off their assumption.

9           Thank you for the time and I appreciate  
10          this opportunity.

11          MS. PERRY: Marcus, thank you so much for  
12          your comment.

13          Alan, if you could go to the next  
14          commenter, please.

15          MR. BELNIAK: We'll do another hand raise  
16          and then we'll flip to a text-based comment.

17          Next hand raised is Cathy. Cathy, just  
18          like the others, I'll send a command to you to  
19          open your line and you'll have 3 minutes to  
20          share your comment on the presentation this  
21          evening.

22          MS. INGHAM: The only reason I'm on the  
23          call is that NBC News today made a brief  
24          mention that this Zoom meeting was occurring  
25          and I had to contact city hall to find out the

1 link. You would have more opposition if more  
2 homeowners and renters knew about this.

3 To the previous commenter, Shawn, this  
4 will be totally from our shoreline. I know  
5 what the dimensions are of the windmills and  
6 they're closer than Atlantic City and higher  
7 than the tallest casino, which is easily  
8 visible from our shoreline in Ocean City. If  
9 the windmills were 50 miles offshore and not  
10 visible, it would have less of an impact.

11 Although the issues raised previously about  
12 impacts by hurricanes, and what you do with  
13 them when -- do you ever get rid of them when  
14 they're -- we read about windmills that when  
15 they're end of life, they're just left there.  
16 And if you want us to accept climate change,  
17 find a property to install these that are less  
18 tourist attractions.

19 I was out west and I saw a lot of wind  
20 farms in isolated areas.

21 Also, we have three branches of  
22 government. We are not a totalitarian  
23 government. This should not have been  
24 implemented by executive order. This is  
25 America. We the people should have had a vote

1 on this project and our vote would've been  
2 known. Ocean City should not have had the  
3 ability to object removed.

4 This will destroy our beautiful beach  
5 community. Having a wind farm off our  
6 beautiful shore is unthinkable. God made our  
7 beach and the beautiful view and you have no  
8 right to destroy that. This will destroy our  
9 tourism and our property values. I and all my  
10 renters are totally against this. And  
11 hopefully vote out of office responsible all  
12 those responsible for promoting this project  
13 like the upset election of Ed Darr. And I know  
14 a truck driver, Steve Sweeney, the New Jersey  
15 State senate president, that promoted this  
16 project. I am praying this project is stopped.

17 Thank you.

18 MS. PERRY: Cathy, thank you so much for  
19 your comment.

20 I just want to provide another quick  
21 reminder for tonight's hearing, we are focusing  
22 only on the proposed Green Acres parkland  
23 diversion in Ocean City. Please do try to  
24 focus your comments specifically on the Green  
25 Acres diversion.

1           Alan, you can move on to the commenter,  
2 please.

3           MR. BELNIAK: Okay, thank you.

4           We'll take two text-based comments so we  
5 can moderate our floors here.

6           Next text-based comment from someone we  
7 haven't heard yet is from Nancy Pina. Nancy  
8 comments: Have there been environmental impact  
9 studies on the health safety of these EMS  
10 cables? I am seeing studies that they increase  
11 leukemia in children under 15 among other  
12 cancers in adults living nearby.

13           Moving to the next text-based comment, the  
14 next is one from Mark, it looks like it's Mark  
15 Hornick. Mark comments what measures will be  
16 taken to prevent permanent damage to wetlands  
17 along Roosevelt Boulevard which is a habitat of  
18 numerous marine animals and birds.

19           Thank you for those comments.

20           Now, I will move back to hands raised.  
21 Looking for people we haven't heard from yet.

22           The next one I see we'll start with Sue  
23 Ann Martino and then on deck is Reverend Beth  
24 Mallozzi, depending on how Reverend Beth says  
25 that.

1 First is Sue Ann Martino.

2 MS. MARTINO: My name is Ray Martino.

3 My first comment is when they put this up  
4 in Block Island, there was a storm and a month  
5 later the cable was actually laying in the  
6 surf. And even though people have talked about  
7 50 feet, nobody has mentioned the most  
8 important thing, and that is the depth of the  
9 cable. And there were no comments of what it's  
10 going to be in the surf.

11 And I can make a comment that when we had  
12 a major storm back in the '60s where the ocean  
13 met the bay, we ended up with you could walk  
14 underneath the cement of the house which means  
15 something like 10 or 15 feet of sand was washes  
16 away, this cable. Then, at that point when you  
17 wash away, you will have EMS problems and the  
18 World Health Organization has made it a class  
19 2B human carcinogen and child leukemia is  
20 possible.

21 Second, the cable itself cannot be  
22 shielded by plastic alone. It breaks down  
23 even. With the steel reinforced, the coded  
24 steel reinforced, they still can't protect  
25 damage to the cable which causes shorts, so

1           they use lead and lead is used over top of the  
2           copper that's carrying the electricity. Lead  
3           is very dangerous, dangerous in the ocean,  
4           dangerous on the beach, and never be used in a  
5           public beach where we have thousands of people.

6           And also, I know we're only supposed to  
7           comment on the cable, but these wind turbines,  
8           the gearbox failures are significant where the  
9           gears and bearings fail. The generator  
10          failures are mainly caused by bearings. They  
11          show failure modes. And so, this is not  
12          reliable power for New Jersey. I do not want  
13          my power dependent upon these windmills.

14          So, they're -- also, these cables are  
15          damaged by wildlife and also dragging cables  
16          that can pull these things up and damage them.  
17          This is not a reliable system. And I believe  
18          will be dangerous by bringing it on a public  
19          beach where there are thousands of children  
20          over the summertime.

21                 Thank you.

22                 MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comment.

23                 Alan, next comment, please.

24                 Next, we'll turn to Reverend Beth  
25                 Mallozzi.

1 REVEREND MALLOZZI: My name is Elizabeth  
2 Mallozzi. The importance of our cooperation in  
3 this project cannot be overstated. Ocean City  
4 has people that know our turf and know it well.  
5 I want their influence as we contribute to the  
6 positive impact away from fossil fuel use,  
7 toward clean power, which is an urgent  
8 compelling need that needs to be addressed.

9 As a resident, I want Ocean City to have  
10 maximum benefits as well for the potential  
11 impact on our community as well as the  
12 diversions being proposed. What additional  
13 benefits can be offered?

14 I also want to thank you those who are  
15 deeply involved for your research and care of  
16 the people who are being impacted, for  
17 listening the concerns, and hearing of the  
18 problems so that they can be addressed.

19 I also want to thank you for what you do  
20 to impact the many who will benefit at its  
21 completion.

22 Thank you for carefully studying all of  
23 the challenges that are facing wind power and  
24 learning from the past so that we're not facing  
25 the issues that have been named or that have



1           been a part of the history of wind power in its  
2           less desirable ways.

3           That's it, thank you.

4           MS. PERRY: Thank you so much for your  
5           comments, Reverend Elizabeth.

6           MR. BELNIAK: I'll turn to the two  
7           text-based comments and then we'll go back to  
8           the raised hand.

9           The next text-based comment is from  
10          Deborah Fox Walsh. And Deborah comments: I  
11          think this project is a good idea as a clean  
12          energy source, but my concern is safety.

13          While the HDD construction for completed  
14          project present any risk to public during  
15          everyday use, will storms or flooding on the  
16          Island of Ocean City, and Marmora, and  
17          Beesley's Point be a problem and create a  
18          hazardous situation?

19          The line goes directly under the southern  
20          edge of the Green Acres playground on 34 and 35  
21          Street, under the beach, and in the  
22          neighborhood under streets, bridges, and  
23          Roosevelt Boulevard, under and through  
24          wetlands, the bay, and under the New Jersey  
25          parkway. Are there any risks to humans and

1 wildlife around the entire vicinity of the  
2 project? What about boats and aircrafts around  
3 the turbines and how will they be protected?

4 Thank you, Deborah Fox Walsh.

5 One more text-based comment and we'll go  
6 back to raised hands. Next text-based comment  
7 is from Kathy. Kathy said that did not answer  
8 the question as to what streets are impacted by  
9 the blocks.

10 My apologies, Kathy. You commented  
11 earlier. I'm trying to get to the new  
12 commenters first and then if there's time at  
13 the end, we'll come back to people who have  
14 already had the opportunity.

15 With that flipping, over to the raised  
16 hands, next up is Robin Shaffer and on deck is  
17 Patty Cronheim.

18 Robin, I'm going to send the command to  
19 you to open your mic, unmute your line. With  
20 that, just like the others, you'll have a fresh  
21 3 minutes to share your comments with the  
22 group.

23 MR. SHAFFER: Hi, good evening. Thank you  
24 very much.

25 I live in Ocean City. I do want to thank

1 the presenters for being here this evening.

2 I wanted to also cite an earlier  
3 commenter, Marcus Sibley. I'm not sure if I  
4 got his last name correct, but I appreciate his  
5 comment because one of things that I think is  
6 problematic here, not just about the Green  
7 Acres diversion, but the project as a whole is  
8 that this is being ran through and imposed upon  
9 the residents of the region without our buy in.

10 We're the ones that are going to have to  
11 deal with the impacts and we're not. It feels  
12 like both the government of New Jersey,  
13 Governor Murphy, and Ørsted, they're not  
14 working with us to educate us about what this  
15 project -- what benefits this project might  
16 have for Ocean City. All I see as of benefit  
17 of the city is -- I see visual impact. I see  
18 substantial negatives to wildlife with  
19 migratory habits, waterfowl. I see land being  
20 grabbed from Ocean City without the support or  
21 approval of our city. Our town's rights are  
22 being stripped away.

23 What you have -- I see this is the basic  
24 elements of why not in my backyard exists if  
25 you don't work hand in glove with the people

1       whose lives you're going effect, you're going  
2       to get this kind of opposition. I have to say  
3       I'm 100 percent opposed to this project because  
4       of the way this is being ran through. I wish  
5       it was being done in a different way.

6               I actually do believe in clean energy. I  
7       just don't believe that this project -- that  
8       enough study has been done on this project and  
9       I don't believe that this is the right place  
10      and right time for it.

11             Thank you.

12             MS. PERRY: Thanks for your comment.

13             Next commenter, please.

14             MR. BELNIAK: Just to bring everyone up to  
15      speed, we currently have 168 attendees, 7 of  
16      which are joined via telephone. There are 8  
17      raised hands, none on the telephone. We have a  
18      handful of comments. I'm saying handful  
19      because there are several comments that are  
20      doubled up or tripled from people who have  
21      already commented before so it's hard me to  
22      discern the new comments. Just want to give a  
23      context of what's going on.

24             With that, I'm going to turn to Patty  
25      Cronheim.

1 MR. CRONHEIM: My name is Patty Cronheim  
2 and I'm the Campaigns Director for the New  
3 Jersey League of Conservation Voter. The  
4 League of Conservation Voters, we elect  
5 environmentally responsible candidates. We  
6 advocate a strong environment policy and we  
7 hold our elected officials accountable to  
8 safeguard the health of our community, and the  
9 beauty of our state, and the strength of our  
10 economy.

11 I also facilitate New Jersey Wind Works,  
12 which is a coalition of 14 environmental  
13 organizations that support offshore wind as we  
14 recognize it is an important tool in fighting  
15 against climate change and a very important  
16 part of New Jersey's affordable energy future  
17 along with solar.

18 I just wanted to say in terms of Green  
19 Acre diversion, I was heartened to hear that  
20 you're going to be doing the construction off  
21 season because we certainly don't want any  
22 construction, any more than is needed for the  
23 Ocean City economy and the streets ripped out  
24 not during the summer. It's really important.

25 We also would like there to be no net loss

1 for Green Acres. For the approximately .8  
2 acres, we would like to see that Green Acres  
3 applied somewhere else.

4 MR. BELNIAK: Patty, I want to pause you  
5 for 1 second. We do have a court reporter and  
6 if you could slow it down just a bit. I just  
7 want to make sure it gets accurately captioned.

8 MR. CRONHEIM: Give me 5 more seconds.

9 The biggest threat to our ocean is not  
10 turbines, it's climate change. It's the  
11 decreased temperature that destroyed ecosystems  
12 and rising waters. Our coast in New Jersey and  
13 our coastlines in New Jersey are more --

14 (Inaudible.)

15 -- than anywhere else in the country and  
16 we recognize that and how important this is to  
17 help fight that.

18 Personally, I'm really heartened by the  
19 where the cable is coming on the line and where  
20 it's connecting at BL England, the BL England  
21 site. I was one of the --

22 (Inaudible.)

23 -- and conversion of that whole plant  
24 which is polluting this community. It was  
25 going to be converted into a gas plant. It

1 would've created many hundreds of tons of  
2 undisturbed matter, VFC, and hazardous air  
3 pollutants. Those smokestacks are planned to  
4 be coming down by the developer and instead  
5 will have developed into something that really  
6 would be an asset to the area and also have the  
7 interconnect at the cable there. And that's  
8 just for energy that's in a stored --

9 (Inaudible.)

10 -- I just want to end by saying for every  
11 gigawatt of offshore wind that is produced,  
12 that's the equivalent of a large gas power  
13 plant that pollutes many of the people of New  
14 Jersey. We all breathe the air but especially  
15 in the low-income communities of color that  
16 tend to live closer to the power plant. There  
17 is a lot, a lot of benefit to New Jersey that  
18 comes from producing offshore wind and  
19 producing power in a clean way.

20 Thank you very much for your time and for  
21 holding this scoping hearing.

22 MS. PERRY: Thank you so much.

23 Alan, next commenter, please.

24 MR. BELNIAK: For those of you who have  
25 prepared your remarks for your 3 minutes today,

1           thank you very much for doing so for the  
2           diligence. If you could, just please speak at  
3           just a slightly slower pace to make sure the  
4           court reporter can accurately capture your  
5           comments.

6           With that, I'm going to flip over to a  
7           text-based comment, but on deck, please Jane  
8           Kegelman. Please get ready. And then after  
9           that, Robert Zuczek. Hopefully, I said that  
10          name correctly. I'm sure I'll find out in just  
11          a moment if I did or didn't. But while Jane  
12          and Robert get ready to get their mics to come  
13          on the line, I'm going to read a comment from  
14          John Joyce. John types I'm incredibly  
15          concerned about the wind turbines being  
16          installed as a green alternative while reading  
17          articles by people like Tom Leonard in  
18          Sweetwater, Texas identifying the significant  
19          environmental impact of the turbines occupying  
20          many acres of landfill in Texas. He had  
21          discussed 4,000 worn out turbines occupying 25  
22          acres of landfill. They seemingly cannot be  
23          recycled and also pose risks for leaking oil,  
24          catching fire, and freezing in cold climates.  
25          I oppose the project, John Joyce.



1           One more text-based comment before we flip  
2           over to Jane. And the comment is from Ed  
3           Nebloch and Ed comments: I am Ed Nebloch and I  
4           wish to express my complete support for the  
5           proposed Ocean Wind energy project. Climate  
6           change and ocean rise is real. What is the  
7           designed lifetime of the installed cables?  
8           Will installed cable capacity surpass the  
9           initial wind farm capacity?

10           Thank you.

11           MS. PERRY: Before we move on, I just want  
12           to thank those text-based comments for  
13           providing those comments. Just, again, to  
14           remind folks that we are hoping that you'll  
15           focus your comments specifically on the Green  
16           Acres diversion here this evening.

17           Thanks so much.

18           MR. BELNIAK: Thank you, Katharine, to  
19           keep us on track.

20           Next, as I mentioned a moment ago, is --  
21           hopefully I'm saying this right -- is Jane  
22           Kegelman.

23           MS. KEGELMAN: My name is Jane Kegelman  
24           and we own property 35 and Central. We are one  
25           house from the beach. I did get a certified

1 mail, which I didn't find quickly enough, so I  
2 came to this meeting. My question is if this  
3 goes through, and I'm not a proponent of it at  
4 all, but if it goes through how will it affect  
5 our home? Our view of the beach? I know  
6 you're saying it's going to be 50 feet  
7 underground, but you also own a portion of the  
8 beach now if this goes through. Will it have  
9 signage on the beach saying this is a windmill  
10 line? How do you foresee what's going on? And  
11 what happens with the drilling of all of this  
12 and the way the ocean could flood since we're  
13 on the high point of the island and we've  
14 always been happy to know that we are safer  
15 than many other areas. Will this all impact  
16 everything? How is it going to impact our home  
17 when all of this is being done? Will there be  
18 damage to our home? I'm more concerned with  
19 the actual not having the windmills go in. But  
20 if this happens, I want to know how is it going  
21 to impact our home?

22 That's it.

23 MS. PERRY: Thank you, Jane.

24 Next comment please, Alan.

25 MR. BELNIAK: Sure. On deck is Robert

1           Zuczek. Hopefully, I'm saying that correctly,  
2           Robert. Then, we'll do two text-based comments  
3           and then we'll come back.

4           Robert, there should be a command for you  
5           to open up your line.

6           MR. ZUCZEK: You were close, not too bad.

7           My comment is that I find this public  
8           meeting or hearing completely oxymoronic simply  
9           for the fact that Ocean City has been shut out  
10          from their ability to have any say in what is  
11          happening with this project. It goes against  
12          all constitutional principles that our country  
13          was founded upon. We do not do things in this  
14          country by executive fiat. If this project is  
15          so spectacular, it should've been put up by  
16          referendum in the state for citizens to vote  
17          upon. You are going to destroy one of God's  
18          greatest natural resources that he has provided  
19          to this good earth all in the name of money  
20          done by an executive order of a governor. It  
21          is truly unbelievable that Ocean City has no  
22          say in this.

23          I appreciate all the comments that --  
24          former comments have made. I am completely  
25          against this project, agree wholeheartedly with

1 the comments that have been made against this  
2 project and I hope that it never happens.

3 Thank you for the opportunity.

4 MS. PERRY: Thank you so much.

5 MR. BELNIAK: I'm now going to turn to a  
6 couple text-based comments and then we'll come  
7 back to some raised hands. Those raised hands,  
8 Tony Butch, you're on deck and then Gianna  
9 Marrese you are after that, so please get ready  
10 after these next text comments.

11 The next comment from someone we haven't  
12 heard from yet is from Cindi Sutera. And Cindi  
13 comments: I am a homeowner in Ocean City.  
14 This project is disaster.

15 And next text-based comment is from  
16 someone we haven't heard from is Mike, Mike  
17 Deeb. Mike has two comments separated by a  
18 carriage return. Mike comments: Good day.  
19 Can you explain why if the law requires that  
20 the project provide funds for the replacement  
21 of three times the total acreage to be diverted  
22 and compensate Ocean City for the value of the  
23 easement that the project is offering 10X the  
24 appraised value and the diverted parcels? Why  
25 offer more when the law only requires 3X the

1 appraised value?

2 Thank you, Mike.

3 I will now flip to Tony Butch and then  
4 next is Gianna Marrese.

5 Tony, you should now have a command to  
6 open your line. Just a reminder, like the  
7 others, please state your name for the court  
8 report and you'll have 3 minutes to share your  
9 comment on the diversion project.

10 MR. BUTCH: Tony Butch. Based on the  
11 project and where you're going, the one thing  
12 that kind of sticks out is that we're all  
13 probably have a keystone external pipeline with  
14 everything that's going on and I remember when  
15 that was going down, there were a lot of people  
16 that were upset about eminent domain, and  
17 people's property being taken from this  
18 pipeline, and that's what's happening here, and  
19 just kind of coming in and taking this piece of  
20 property that belongs to the people of Ocean  
21 City and doing what you want with it. When it  
22 turns that there's a lot of people that aren't  
23 in support have been kind of shut out of this  
24 conversation based on the current  
25 administration we have in D.C. as well as our

1 state administration.

2 It's just crazy to think that what's  
3 happening at such a big magnitude is going in.  
4 If we were really concerned about climate  
5 change and taking care of the emissions and  
6 going out there, then nuclear should be what we  
7 should be looking at. We keep being told over  
8 and over again that Europe is so far ahead of  
9 us, decades ahead of us, they have hundreds of  
10 thousands of turbines out there. I don't know  
11 what you've seen but I still see their coastal  
12 communities flooding. I still see storms  
13 hitting their beaches. When are we going to  
14 see when the return is going to come there? We  
15 have countries like Germany that were really,  
16 really far down the line with wind energy and  
17 now they're scaling back. You have countries  
18 like France that didn't take that extremely  
19 like we're looking to take here and they put  
20 their money in nuclear and they're producing  
21 less carbon emissions than Germany is who is  
22 one of the leaders in wind.

23 I just don't think what's going on here is  
24 the right way to go with it. I think it's  
25 happening too fast, too quick. I think by the

1 time we started to build if it happens to get  
2 there, that the technology is going to outpace  
3 and these things are already old, it's not  
4 quite there yet, and given the no battery  
5 storage, only giving energy when the wind  
6 blows, I think there's a lot of information  
7 that people aren't having access to. If people  
8 want to see what's going on in Europe and what  
9 happened there, they could check out  
10 ProtectOurCoastNJ.com.

11 Thank you.

12 MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comment.

13 Alan, next comment, please.

14 MR. BELNIAK: Next is Giana Marrese. I'm  
15 going to send the command for you to open your  
16 line.

17 And just for everyone's context, we have  
18 154 attendees, 4 raised hands, including  
19 Gianna's which we're going to get to in just a  
20 moment, we've got a handful of new comments in  
21 text form which we'll get to also as well.

22 With that, Gianna, you should now have a  
23 command to open your line. I'm going reset the  
24 clock here. With that, you can share your name  
25 for the court reporter and 3 minutes for your

1           comments with the group.

2           MS. MARRESE: Good evening. My name is  
3           Gianna Marrese.

4           I am opposed to this project and I will  
5           say there must be no action taken because  
6           there's no compelling need. I will say our sea  
7           level rise is real. Climate change is real.  
8           However, this project isn't going to solve  
9           these problems; if anything, it's just going to  
10          create more environmental problems. You can  
11          definitely learn about this on  
12          ProtectOurCoastNJ.com,  
13          P-R-O-T-E-C-TOurCoastNJ.com.

14          I want to know when are you guys going to  
15          answer these questions from the public because  
16          it seems like there's a lot of valid questions  
17          and they're just not getting answered like we  
18          were told they would be answered. And I want  
19          to know when there will be a public meeting in  
20          person that people can ask. It's kind of  
21          pathetic with the lack of public awareness and  
22          notification of this meeting. Poor Jane, she's  
23          a homeowner and she had no idea about this  
24          project. You guys should be knocking door to  
25          door asking them how they feel about this



1 project. Poor Jane had no idea.

2 I mean look at the attendance. It speaks  
3 for itself right now.

4 Again, if you want to learn more, please  
5 visit [ProtectOurCoastNJ.com](http://ProtectOurCoastNJ.com).

6 Thank you.

7 MS. PERRY: Thank you, Gianna. Next  
8 comment, Alan.

9 MR. BELNIAK: Next comment is from L Logan  
10 in the text. And L Logan comments if this  
11 project is forced through, is there an  
12 opportunity to bury the current overhead  
13 electric lines along Roosevelt Boulevard as  
14 part of this project to create a more  
15 attractive entranceway into the city? This  
16 would be an example of the project leaving  
17 things in a better condition as noted in the  
18 presentation as a goal, Leslie Logan.

19 We'll do another text-based comment and  
20 then Carla Joyce, just a head's up, for a hand  
21 raise, you are on deck. But first this  
22 text-based comment from Craig Adler. I was  
23 late to the meeting. If this was discussed, no  
24 need to share. Are you able to share any  
25 issues that occurred in other previous

1 installations in sustained operations of  
2 offshore wind projects? Also, explain the  
3 preventative maintenance program to ensure  
4 install safety and environmental safety.

5 So, now flipping back to hand raise again  
6 I just mentioned a moment ago Carla Joyce and  
7 then on deck is Rachel Dawn Davis.

8 Carla, we will send the command to you to  
9 open your line. I'm going to reset the clock  
10 here. Hopefully, you can see it on the screen  
11 3 minutes. Please state your name for the  
12 court reporter and share it with the group.

13 MS. JOYCE: My name is Carla Joyce.

14 Can you hear me okay?

15 MR. BELNIAK: Yes, we can.

16 MS. JOYCE: I'm with Gianna. I came to  
17 the meeting today hoping for some answers.  
18 I've heard a lot of good questions, a lot of  
19 concerns that any citizen of our city would be  
20 concerned about and yet no answers from  
21 anybody. Is there going to be a meeting when  
22 we can actually have some answers and  
23 discussions about this? And maybe the concerns  
24 we have aren't real but we don't know that  
25 until the questions are asked and answered.

1           That's really all I had to say.

2           MS. PERRY: Thank you, Carla.

3           I do just want to note this is a scoping  
4 hearing so we are collecting comments this  
5 evening. At the close of the comment period,  
6 we will be preparing a response to comment  
7 document that addressed the comments we  
8 received tonight.

9           Thank you.

10          MR. BELNIAK: Next, as I mentioned before,  
11 on deck is Rachel Dawn Davis and after Rachel  
12 is Eileen Murphy.

13          With that, Rachel Dawn Davis, I'm going to  
14 send a command to you to open up your mic.

15          MS. DAVIS: Rachel Davis, I'm public  
16 policy and justice organizer for Water Spirit,  
17 a non-partisan, non-profit spiritual ecology  
18 center and ministry of the Sisters of St.  
19 Joseph of Peace.

20          I agree and echo what Marcus Sibley,  
21 M.S.W., shared and some others that the onus is  
22 on the developer to ramp up the educational  
23 effort in the surrounding communities as well  
24 as across the entire state. It is clear  
25 tonight is only a fraction of representation,

1 right, as was mentioned earlier.

2 I would like more information on what job  
3 training options, licenses necessary for the  
4 work to be done for those jobs to be local if  
5 this goes through, mainly for repairs and  
6 maintenance specific to this Green Acres piece  
7 as well as overall. We agree that the EIS  
8 studies must be done with respect to this  
9 diversion and that Ocean City's community be  
10 fully engaged. It is vital that all renewable  
11 energy resources are scrutinized to the fullest  
12 extent including radiation and we must focus on  
13 getting off gas, which is not natural, is not  
14 reliable, ravages creation, wastes fresh water.  
15 It's also not subject to any oversight or  
16 regulations through legislative loopholes.  
17 It's not subject to the Clean Air Act, the  
18 Drinking Water Act, et cetera. We are talking  
19 point today that are 12 years old. Again, the  
20 education needs to be done.

21 Gas is not a necessary bridge fuel. All  
22 solutions like this perpetuate the choking of  
23 our beloved ocean. Fossil fuel emissions,  
24 mainly methane, are exacerbating the major  
25 storm and climate crises we are literally

1 experiencing for years now.

2 High quality of life is important for  
3 everyone throughout the state. And no child is  
4 more worthy than clean air or water than any  
5 other. We support renewable energy done right  
6 and will continue to bear witness and remind  
7 everyone that community knows itself fact and  
8 is important to listen and learn from  
9 community.

10 Thank you.

11 MS. PERRY: Thank you so much for that  
12 innocent.

13 Next comment, Alan, please.

14 MR. BELNIAK: Next commenter is Eileen  
15 Murphy. Eileen, I'm going to send the command  
16 to you open your mic and on deck is Mike Tobin.

17 MS. MURPHY: I'm Eileen Murphy with New  
18 Jersey Audubon.

19 So, in addition to our mission connecting  
20 people with nature, we have a research  
21 department that conducts studies on migratory  
22 shore birds and is intimately and expansively  
23 following the potential impacts on wind  
24 turbines on birds and wildlife. I can't tell  
25 you how gladdened I am to share about the

1 concerns that residents have about wildlife and  
2 birds and I share those concerns. And I'd like  
3 folks to know that New Jersey Audubon has been  
4 reviewing offshore wind projects for many, many  
5 years. And, in fact, we were opposed to the  
6 original use variance that were only 3 miles  
7 offshore as they really impacted the pathways  
8 of the migratory birds. However, we do support  
9 the current development plans at the 15 miles  
10 offshore. We feel those are responsibly cited.

11 For tonight, regarding the impacts of the  
12 cabling specifically, we have reviewed the data  
13 and we reviewed the data from other states with  
14 similar issues, looking at the potential  
15 impacts, nesting birds, and we have concluded  
16 that any impacts are temporary and minor.

17 On the other hand, impacts due to climate  
18 change and the rising seas that result have a  
19 significant and permanent impact on birds their  
20 habitat and other wildlife. I do want to call  
21 attention to folks who are interested in more  
22 information on the offshore wind impacts on  
23 wildlife including the cabling issues to a  
24 really robust data set. The new regional  
25 wildlife science entity -- and I'll give you

1 the website for that -- it has consolidated the  
2 research from all the states along the Atlantic  
3 seaboard, so that scientists from Massachusetts  
4 and Maine can share their information with  
5 scientists from North Carolina, and Georgia,  
6 and New Jersey. New Jersey Audubon is a member  
7 of that entity and we both contribute to and  
8 learn from the many scientists within that  
9 community.

10 That website is [NEOceanplanning.org/RWSE](http://NEOceanplanning.org/RWSE),  
11 and I'll put it in the Q and A.

12 Thank you so much.

13 MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comment,  
14 Eileen.

15 If you could go to the next comment, Alan.

16 MR. BELNIAK: The next hand raise from  
17 someone we have not heard from yet is Mike  
18 Tobin.

19 Mike, I'm going to send the command to you  
20 to open up your line. Before we do that, just  
21 to give context to everyone, we have 137  
22 attendees. Mike has his hand raised. Someone  
23 else has their hand raised. We've heard from  
24 them before.

25 After Mike, we're going to go to some new

1 text comments and then we'll keep proceeding  
2 with the evening.

3 Mike, you should be able to open up your  
4 line. With that, you'll have the floor, a  
5 fresh 3 minutes to share with us your name and  
6 your comment.

7 MR. TOBIN: Mike Tobin; I have been told  
8 that our electric bills are going to be going  
9 up as a result of the turbines going up. Why  
10 is the general public going to be funding a  
11 private operation? I guess that's my question.  
12 Maybe I'm misinformed. Why are we paying for  
13 this? If, in fact, we are paying for it, I do  
14 agree with the previous commenter who said  
15 nuclear is a better option. So, that's my  
16 comment.

17 And, Katharine, could you please clarify  
18 what you meant at the end of the meeting you  
19 were going to put together responses. When  
20 will we get responses or in what medium will  
21 they be coming through on? That's all.

22 MS. PERRY: Thanks, Mike, for your  
23 comment.

24 And to clarify, following the close of the  
25 public comment period, which is on March 20 --



1 let me make sure I don't say the wrong thing  
2 here -- March 21, we will be preparing a  
3 response to comments document that provides  
4 responses on the comments we receive here  
5 tonight and that will be provided to NJ DEP and  
6 we will post that on our website.

7 Thanks.

8 Alan, next comment.

9 MR. BELNIAK: I'm going to turn to some  
10 text-based comments for a moment. The next one  
11 that we have from someone who we have not heard  
12 or in this case read from yet is Susan Celia.  
13 And Susan comments: Why wasn't a solar  
14 alternative offered instead of a noisy, large,  
15 obtrusive, environmentally unfriendly wind  
16 turbine? That's Susan's comment.

17 Another text-based comment. This one is  
18 from Peggy Dennison. Peggy comments: Good  
19 evening. Thank you for the opportunity to  
20 voice our concerns. I am fully opposed to this  
21 project. In the Green Acres diversion process,  
22 a compelling public need is required. Two  
23 executive orders from one person to governor is  
24 not a democratic process. Heaven forbid this  
25 destructive folly of a project goes forward,

1 here are a few of my specific  
2 questions/concerns.

3 One, why is a 30-foot wide easement needed  
4 when directional boring can be done more  
5 accurately in a smaller space.

6 Two, at the end of the lifecycle of the  
7 wind turbine project, will the materials  
8 themselves such as cables, turbines,  
9 foundations, et cetera be completely removed  
10 and the disturbance area restored?

11 Three, are funds being escrowed for the  
12 demolition, removal, restoration of the  
13 disturbed areas when the lifecycle of these  
14 materials are exhausted?

15 Bear with me for one moment while I scan  
16 the list.

17 The next text-based comment from someone  
18 we've neither hear nor read from yet is Carol  
19 Snyder Hare. And Carol comments: I am quite  
20 concerned with the comments to all proposed  
21 questions and comments as I noticed that the  
22 written comments are responded to with this  
23 question has been answered live. That's the  
24 Zoom webinar feature. There has been no  
25 response to the comments and/or questions

1 proposed other than thank you for your  
2 comments.

3 In all fairness, thanking people for their  
4 comments is hardly a proper answer to comments  
5 proposed. Where will commenters be able to  
6 find responses to their comments?

7 Katharine, if I may step in, I'm not going  
8 to comment -- pardon me for the meta comment --  
9 comment on the responses to questions. The  
10 "your question has been answered live" is just  
11 a response that the Zoom webinar, this  
12 platform, does. I don't have any control over  
13 what that is. What that's just letting you  
14 know is your comment has come in, we have then  
15 read it into the record. That's the button I  
16 press. That's the response you see. I don't  
17 have any control over that. That's just the  
18 mechanism that we're using, so I just wanted to  
19 clear that up.

20 The next text-based comment that I see  
21 from someone we haven't heard from or read from  
22 yet is Jimmy C. Jimmy comments under Q and A  
23 it says -- same thing -- this question has been  
24 answered live. I haven't heard one question  
25 answered live. Why is this canned reply being

1 used?

2 I just heard Katharine Perry state that  
3 all questions raised here tonight will be  
4 answered later. Is there a link to be  
5 provided to read the Q and A after tonight's  
6 meeting?

7 Thank you.

8 MR. BELNIAK: Once again, I don't have  
9 control over the text that the Zoom webinar  
10 platform uses. Again, it's just an  
11 acknowledgment that we have seen your question,  
12 we verbalized it into the record, and it moves  
13 it out of our queue to let everyone know that  
14 we have addressed that one.

15 MS. PERRY: Again, just confirming that  
16 that response to comments document will be  
17 posted on the website after the hearing period  
18 closes.

19 MR. BELNIAK: This is a bit of a  
20 procedural comment from Michael deVlieger.  
21 Michael comments: My hand has been raised.  
22 I'm not being called on. Why?

23 Michael, I do not see your hand raised, so  
24 I cannot call on you. If you'd like to check,  
25 please re-raise it. There you go, okay.

1           With that, Michael, I'm going to send a  
2           command to you to open your line. With that,  
3           just like others, please state your name for  
4           the court reporter. Speak your comments slowly  
5           and clearly and you've got 3 minutes to share  
6           your comments with us.

7           Michael, on my end, I do see you as  
8           unmuted. You must have a hardware issue on  
9           your end or if you have headset like me, you  
10          might be hard muted and not know it but the  
11          indication to me is that I have sent the  
12          command and you have unmuted your line. We  
13          just can't hear you. We'll give you another  
14          couple seconds; if not, try again. No, I saw  
15          you mute and then unmute, but we still can't  
16          hear you. Sorry. The only other thing you can  
17          try is you might be able to change your audio  
18          input device.

19          While you work on that, Michael, I'm going  
20          to move to the next person, our next text-based  
21          comment, and we'll see if we can come back to  
22          you.

23          Next text comment is from Jim Ericson.  
24          Jim comments: From this forum, it is clear  
25          that the important information was not included

1 in this presentation and has not been conveyed  
2 to the Ocean City community and people  
3 throughout the state. I question whether  
4 sufficient studies have been conducted relating  
5 to the risks and dangers to both people,  
6 wildlife, and the environment, and feel that  
7 those impacted should be entitled to a full  
8 study of the impacts.

9 There's a follow on from Jim. Sorry -- a  
10 carriage return. Jim also comments with the  
11 previous comment Jim made was I am opposed to  
12 this project and feel that my rights to an  
13 opinion have not been honored without the right  
14 to vote on this.

15 Thank you.

16 We will try Michael one more time.  
17 Michael, I'm going to send a command to open  
18 your line.

19 I do see that you have unmuted your line,  
20 but, Michael, we cannot hear.

21 Project team, is it just me that can't  
22 hear Michael? Can anyone else here Michael?

23 MS. PERRY: Cannot hear Michael, no.

24 MR. BELNIAK: We will try in earnest. I'm  
25 going to move to someone else and we'll keep

1           trying to come back to you, I promise.

2           John Ferrante comments: Could you provide  
3           the website address for the replies to  
4           questions and comments will be posted.

5           What I will do is I'm going to paste into  
6           the chat some comments -- the information that  
7           conveyed on the prior slide. Depending on when  
8           you joined, you might not see in the chat. For  
9           the benefit of everyone else, I'm going to put  
10          that into the chat once more. As of now, you  
11          should all see the various ways to reach out  
12          the project team for your comments as well as  
13          the project website for following  
14          communications.

15          Thank you for that, John.

16          Next text-based comment is from Roger.  
17          And Roger asks -- I'm sorry -- Roger comments:  
18          When this project starts, and I'm sure it will  
19          be approved, where will all the staging  
20          activity, workers, barges, and trucks be  
21          operating out of? Which port, inlet, or city?  
22          And we will have more activity on land than  
23          sea? Sorry. It says we will have more  
24          activity on land than sea, question mark. I  
25          think he means will we.

1 I'm looking at the list. Right now,  
2 everyone's wondering what I'm looking at. All  
3 the remaining comments, I believe, are folks  
4 from people that we've read from or heard from  
5 before. So, please bear with me for one moment  
6 while I just confirm that. I want to make sure  
7 everyone has gotten a chance to offer a comment  
8 at least once before we consider repeat  
9 speakers and repeat typers.

10 There is another new comment, okay, so  
11 thank you for bearing with me. The next new  
12 text comment is from Laura Helwig. I hope I'm  
13 saying that -- or Laura Helvig. Laura  
14 comments: I'm opposed to this project and  
15 disappointed at not having the ability to vote  
16 on this project. I'm very concerned about the  
17 cabled and the EMS emitted by the cables that  
18 are going through our neighborhoods. I'm also  
19 disappointed in the lack of details in this  
20 presentation as well as the lack of  
21 environmental studies performed. This scoping  
22 hearing is clearly showing that the community  
23 has not been provided the necessary data.

24 Okay, looking at hands raised.

25 One more text-based comment, again, from a



1 new comment is from E Tedala. I hope I'm  
2 saying that right. I'm guessing it's a first  
3 initial and last name but could be wrong. E  
4 Tedala comments: How do Ocean City residents  
5 and homeowners report their concerns directly  
6 to BPU and DEP?

7 For everyone's interest, we have 118  
8 attendees. We do have one hand raised and that  
9 is from someone whose comment we read prior.  
10 And I do believe the remaining text-based  
11 comments are from everyone who either spoke or  
12 commented already. I just want to check in  
13 with the project team. And I believe looking  
14 at my notes here, we're going to then turn  
15 to -- just before we do that, I'm going to give  
16 Michael one more opportunity. Michael does  
17 have his hand raised. So, Michael, let's give  
18 this one more shot. Michael, you should have a  
19 command to unmute your line.

20 MR. DEVLIEGER: My name is Michael  
21 deVlieger.

22 And, you know, for those folks who want to  
23 know when they're going to get their questions  
24 answered, I was the elected official for the  
25 last nine and a half years, and a couple years

1           ago I had a series of questions in the opening  
2           meeting with Ørsted on this very topic. And  
3           I'm still waiting for those answers. Right  
4           now, I'm not in elected office but I'm throwing  
5           my hat it doesn't come back because it doesn't  
6           look like this project is going away.

7           I encourage you to stay on top of this  
8           because you'll be amazed how little gets  
9           answered. In the course of this evening, I've  
10          counted four people that were pro this project,  
11          one seemed neutral, and the rest had their  
12          reservations about this. I think that that's  
13          about equivalent to what we have here on the  
14          island. Of the four that were pro, I'd like to  
15          see how many of them actually live here, reside  
16          here, or own a vacation home here because we're  
17          the people that get impacted.

18          I'm not anti-green. I'm not  
19          anti-windmill. I love green energy and I would  
20          love to reduce our carbon footprint as much as  
21          the next guy. There's no -- we don't get  
22          answers for serious questions on this project,  
23          and, you know, they do everything they can to  
24          dodge us and proceed on, like taking away our  
25          home rule. We were speaking perfectly directly

1 with Ørsted and their representatives and they  
2 decided to take another path. Our concerns,  
3 our citizens' concerns are legitimate, okay.  
4 The concerns about the environment, the  
5 concerns about the fish, the fishermen and  
6 fisherwomen that are out there risking their  
7 lives going through these wind farms, the  
8 impact on our real estate values, on our  
9 rentals, on the visual portion that it'll up.  
10 What will that do? If your property values go  
11 down, your taxes go up, guys, not a difficult  
12 formula to figure out.

13 All these things are involved but they  
14 can't tell us, okay, we're going to reduce the  
15 rise in sea level, okay, how much? Are they  
16 going to reduce it an inch, a half inch, a  
17 foot. I'm being sarcastic when I say that.  
18 What I'm saying is they can't tell us what  
19 we're getting out of it, but we know that our  
20 electric rates are going to go up. We know  
21 that we have potential harm coming to the  
22 island by them putting these power lines  
23 through. They told me in a meeting they could  
24 go around. They could go through the inlet.  
25 Well, why haven't they gone through the inlet?

1 MR. BELNIAK: Michael, you're at about 3  
2 minutes just an FYI.

3 MR. DEVLIEGER: Do your homework and see  
4 it for what it is. But we need -- I encourage  
5 our citizens, whether I'm in office or not, to  
6 use every legal and civil disobedient method  
7 that we can do within reason, of course, to  
8 make them come to the table and answer these  
9 questions and do -- environmental impact hasn't  
10 even been completed yet and yet they're trying  
11 to jam it down our throats. What kind of sense  
12 does that make? It makes no sense. This is  
13 moving way too fast and it needs to be slowed  
14 down and done properly.

15 Thank you very much.

16 MR. BELNIAK: All right. We did have one  
17 hand left raised at the moment and it's from  
18 someone who already had commented, so what I'm  
19 going to do is give this person an opportunity  
20 to speak and then we will turn to our  
21 text-based comments. And those are going to be  
22 text-based comments from people who have  
23 already commented once. We have made it pretty  
24 clear at the outset, I just wanted to make sure  
25 we gave every new person an opportunity to

1 comment first before we came back to repeats.

2 With that, I'm going to let Cindi  
3 Sutera -- again, I read a comment of hers  
4 earlier. So, Cindi, also I believe there was a  
5 comment from you typed earlier in the comments.  
6 The name you used is not a name I recognize so.  
7 But any rate, Cindi, you now have 3 minutes.  
8 If you can just state your name for the court  
9 reporter and then you've got a fresh 3 minutes  
10 to share your comments for the record.

11 MS. SUTERA: Thank you, Alan.

12 My name is Cindi Sutera. What I noted in  
13 the comment was my husband and I are here  
14 together. We are homeowners in Ocean City.  
15 And I just would hope that it may be  
16 acknowledged that there may be more than one  
17 person using a single Zoom, so some of those  
18 duplicative comments may be representative of  
19 that but we each have a voice.

20 I am opposed to this project. My comments  
21 may be broader than just the right of way  
22 through Ocean City, but I hope that there will  
23 be considerations made for the questions posed  
24 here to be answered in full. I think this is a  
25 serious issue that will forever change our

1 horizontal, the look of our horizon, not only  
2 for our current existence, but for our children  
3 and their children because these things don't  
4 go away.

5 I've been a resident in Ocean City for  
6 many years and whenever we do a project on the  
7 island that may impact or may not impact, we  
8 are required to notify them. Sometimes the  
9 project requires we notify them with registered  
10 letter. I got no notification of this meeting.  
11 Luckily, I happened to see an article in the  
12 newspaper and saw the link. I don't understand  
13 how by executive order and hook and crook this  
14 is being forced upon us without any proper  
15 notification to the people who are going to be  
16 impacted.

17 Thank you. That's all I have to say.

18 MR. BELNIAK: We do have a few new text  
19 comments in here which I'll read into the  
20 record. The first one is from Matt Behta.  
21 Matt comments: Most of the questions tonight  
22 are opposed to the project in general for a  
23 variety of reasons that are not specific to the  
24 Green Acres problem, which is the subject of  
25 meeting.

1           From a pragmatic perspective, could any  
2           opposition be a factor? The governor signed an  
3           executive order to increase the renewability  
4           energy utilization and approve the contract  
5           with Ørsted and PSEG. Ørsted is executing  
6           their contractual obligations.

7           Are our actions moot? How can we  
8           influence how the project is executed?

9           And moving on to the next new comment was  
10          from John, no last name. John comments: A  
11          simple question. Who is responsible and who  
12          will bear the cost of these removal of these  
13          units when they become obsolete and cover the  
14          environmental cleanup?

15          By my scan, it looks like there are no  
16          remaining hands raised at the moment. Again,  
17          if a new hand comes up, we will certainly give  
18          that person a fresh 3 minutes.

19          The remaining text-based comments for  
20          everyone listening at home is -- are -- the  
21          remaining text-based comments are all people  
22          who have commented prior. So, what I'd like to  
23          just clarify with the rest of the project team  
24          if those are the comments that we'll read into  
25          the record. Because, again, I believe from a

1 text-based perspective, we have covered all new  
2 commenters. If a new comes into the queue  
3 during this process, I can jump to that.

4 I do see a hand raised also from someone  
5 who spoke before. Just like we have done  
6 before, we'll do a few repeat text-based  
7 comments, a few repeat speakers, and we'll just  
8 go back and forth like that.

9 First is from Robert Moss. I believe  
10 Robert also mentioned this in Robert's oral  
11 comment you're off to a poor start because  
12 compelling public need, in quotes, requires,  
13 quote, mitigating hazard to the public health,  
14 safety, or welfare, citing N.J.A.C.7:36-26.1,  
15 section D1. I don't believe this project will  
16 meet that standard. You may mean yield a  
17 significant public benefit. That may sound  
18 like a trivial difference but it reflects the  
19 cavalier attitude of most applicants, the Green  
20 Acres staff, and our sterling courts, and I use  
21 that term sarcastically, writes Robert, for  
22 Green Acres disposals and diversions.

23 Moving down, Suzan Hornick again. Offers  
24 us for more information, please see the website  
25 ProtectOurCoastNJ.com, also cited a few times.



1           A few more from Robert. We'll jump around  
2 a little bit. Kathy commented earlier, who  
3 answered whether the windmills will be visible  
4 from the shoreline?

5           Ray Martino, I see your hand raised.  
6 We're just going to get to a few more  
7 text-based comments so I can kind of tidy up  
8 that queue and we'll get to you next.

9           Let's see. Suzan Hornick also commented  
10 that whoever is speaking now -- this was a time  
11 prior obviously -- did not identify themselves.  
12 Unfortunately, you can't get to that. Then  
13 let's see. Kathy Ingham, thank you to Robert  
14 Zuczek, well said. Thank you, Kathy.

15           I will now turn to Ray Martino. Ray, just  
16 like before, I do ask you to please state your  
17 name again for the court report just so we've  
18 got a complete record of that. And just like  
19 before, you'll get a fresh 3 minutes. When you  
20 do so, the mic is ready for you to open up.

21           MS. MARTINO: Hi, thank you. I limited my  
22 comments the last time to the right of way and  
23 I hear all the rest of these people, especially  
24 ones saying that the ocean is going to come in  
25 and engulf our homes, or whatever, flood. If

1           you look at the book Unsettled, which is the  
2           first real scientific study of climate change,  
3           you will find that the average rate at the  
4           battery at the tip of Manhattan of sea level  
5           rising is 30 centimeters, 1 foot -- that's per  
6           year -- 1 foot per century. And there's a  
7           graph in that book showing the highs and lows  
8           of throughout the century from 1880 to 2020  
9           with the same level, the same angle on the  
10          graph.

11                 So, all of these crazy comments that you  
12           see in the papers and other places are not  
13           necessarily true. So, this is a scientist that  
14           wrote this book that worked for the Obama  
15           administration, worked for a democratic  
16           administration.

17                 In the book, there is increase in  
18           temperature but not at the levels they say and  
19           not with the scientific -- and if you look at  
20           it scientifically, is not an immediate crazy  
21           problem like is presented by the media and  
22           people we just heard on the telephone on the  
23           comments tonight.

24                 If you just look through that, you'll see  
25           the real answer to this is to handle the

1 problems as they come as we've always done, and  
2 that's the best way to do it. And he's  
3 analyzed all the different ways including the  
4 way we're doing today.

5 End of comments. I'm sorry it wasn't  
6 directly on the table but I did it last time  
7 and everybody else didn't pay attention.

8 MS. PERRY: Thank you for your comments,  
9 Ray.

10 MR. BELNIAK: Looking to some text-based  
11 comments again.

12 One was from Craig Cudnik. When will  
13 these very important questions be answered?

14 And next is from Robin Shaffer. Robin  
15 comments: How will this project be  
16 decommissioned at the end of its lifecycle?  
17 Who will be responsible? When will this  
18 happen? And what will happen if a future New  
19 Jersey governor writes a new executive order to  
20 dismantle the project even before it is  
21 operational.

22 Kathy comments: This is not a Q and A, it  
23 is just Q.

24 Peggy Dennison comments: I have a follow  
25 up statement regarding a comment made by Eileen

1 Murphy from the New Jersey Audubon Society.  
2 People on this call should be aware that her  
3 organization has accepted monetary support and  
4 donations from Ørsted.

5 Deborah Fox Walsh comments: Can Ørsted  
6 and PSEG please provide case studies and peer  
7 review research publications that support this  
8 type of energy project in the follow up  
9 document that you will provide to address  
10 public comments given as a result of the Green  
11 Acres meeting. Thank you, Deborah Fox Walsh.

12 Question from Cathy Ingham. When are the  
13 next meetings and how will we be informed of  
14 them?

15 And just for edification, I believe  
16 everyone has probably seen it by now, I don't  
17 think we've had a lot of new people join. Just  
18 in the absence of just to make sure, I'm  
19 repasting into the chat all the way to follow  
20 along with the project including project  
21 websites and ways to submit comments --  
22 information about future meetings should be  
23 made available on the project website.

24 Another text-based comment from Carla  
25 Joyce. Carla: What happens after the

1 responses are posted? Does the community  
2 actually have any input on this decision?

3 Let me just jump down and make sure I  
4 don't see anything new. Bear with me for one  
5 moment please.

6 Okay, two comments from Cindi Sutera. If  
7 you recall, Cindi was the woman who just spoke  
8 a moment ago and was commenting about multiple  
9 people from one home so these two comments  
10 together relate to that. Cindi comments that  
11 her husband typed an earlier comment of which a  
12 fraction was read. As a homeowner, I feel that  
13 I have a right to have my voice heard as well.  
14 And then, Cindi also comments I hope that all  
15 of the comments noted in this area are entered  
16 into the record. I'm disappointed if not able  
17 to share my voice. You have to anticipate that  
18 there be more than one homeowner, more than one  
19 voter per Zoom link.

20 Noted and read into the record.

21 Matt Bechta follows up with the manmade  
22 influence of CO2 on climate change has not been  
23 proven, Unsettled: What Climate Science Tells  
24 Us, What It Doesn't, and Why It Matters,  
25 hardcover, April 27, 2021 by Steven Koonin who

1 was the chief scientist at the D.O.E. in the  
2 Obama administration.

3 Gianna Marrese comments: Instead of  
4 having a public document that answers these  
5 questions, can we have a public Q and A?

6 One more and then we'll flip over. There  
7 are two hands raised. Let me just get one  
8 more. Actually, there's a new one -- excuse  
9 me -- Susan Ruse. For those wondering what the  
10 wind farm will look like from the coast, please  
11 see <https://OceanWind.com/about-the-project>.  
12 What I will do is I think you can get to that  
13 from the Ocean Wind site. So, OceanWind.com is  
14 pasted into the chat and you can follow along  
15 to about-the-project from URL.

16 And then, Suzan continues the comment:  
17 For the matter at hand, we have not seen any  
18 support on the health effects of such cables  
19 running under the beach.

20 I'm going to pause for a moment and drink  
21 some water. During that time, I'm going to  
22 turn to Nathan Brightbill.

23 Nathan, thank you for coming back. We  
24 heard from you earlier. Same applies.

25 MR. BRIGHTBILL: I just have a quick

1 comment or two here.

2 I just want to remind everyone that  
3 Governor Murphy barely was reelected and the  
4 reason is people are rejecting these policies,  
5 this green deal. People just want a better  
6 economy especially now if you think about  
7 what's going on. I think the best thing to do  
8 would be just to put this on the back burner,  
9 give people more time, let them vote on it,  
10 because I know it'll be rejected. These  
11 policies just don't make any sense.

12 I've been going to the beach to the Jersey  
13 shoreline for 50 years and it's the same as it  
14 was back then. And these windmills will ruin  
15 the whole coastline. That's all I have to say.

16 Thank you.

17 MS. PERRY: Thank you, Nathan.

18 MR. BELNIAK: Next, we're going to turn to  
19 a new commenter who we have not heard from or  
20 read from.

21 Dave Roberts. Dave, give me one moment to  
22 reset the clock.

23 Dave, if you've been with us for the  
24 duration of the evening, I think you know how  
25 this works. We're going to send the command

1 for you to unmute your line. Please just state  
2 your name for the court reporter and for the  
3 record. And then, I'll give you fresh 3  
4 minutes to share your comment.

5 Welcome, Dave.

6 MR. ROBERTS: Dave Roberts; how come we  
7 have not been talking about the visibility for  
8 the residents of Ocean City? We keep talking  
9 about how people are going to drive these pipes  
10 down but what are we going to see from the  
11 beach view in June?

12 MS. PERRY: Thanks for your comment, Dave.

13 Just to reiterate that the purpose of this  
14 scoping hearing tonight was to go over the  
15 Green Acres diversions that are proposed.  
16 Additional information on the Ocean Wind 1  
17 project, including visualizations can be found  
18 at the Ocean Wind website which is typed into  
19 the chat. Thanks.

20 MR. BELNIAK: At the moment, we do have  
21 one hand raised. It's a repeat hand. Eileen  
22 Murphy we'll get to you in just a moment. I'm  
23 going to do a couple of repeat text comments to  
24 tidy up our queue here.

25 Robert Moss again why are more parcels to



1 be diverted than are shown to be used in the  
2 slides? The rectangular lot just north of the  
3 yellow line is Block 3500, Lot 1 listed in the  
4 public notice.

5 Cindi Sutera again comments there's no  
6 public need for this. This is a money grab.  
7 This will increase the cost of power  
8 incrementally. It will not improve the  
9 environment. This is being shoved down our  
10 throat by executive order and will offer no  
11 benefit to ocean city or the residents like me.

12 Moving down a little bit. Suzan Hornick  
13 commenting once again. Moderators please  
14 mention Wind Works is founded by and  
15 financially supported by Ørsted.

16 And E Tedala: Based on what I have heard  
17 during this meeting, there have been a lack of  
18 communication -- sorry -- there has been a lack  
19 of communication. Why have all residents of  
20 homeowners not received a certified letter  
21 regarding the impact of this project.

22 And then, next in the queue is actually  
23 from Eileen Murphy, so Eileen also has her hand  
24 reraised.

25 With that, Eileen, I'm going to send a

1 command to open up your mic once more and give  
2 you a fresh 3 minutes. Ideally, you'll cover  
3 the things that are the queue as well and we'll  
4 address two items at once.

5 Eileen, please, the floor is yours for the  
6 3 minutes.

7 MS. MURPHY: In the Q and A, all I did was  
8 enter the website that I referenced earlier  
9 where people can get information on the impact  
10 to birds and wildlife.

11 What I really wanted to do is respond to a  
12 comment that someone had made regarding Ørsted  
13 donating money to New Jersey Audubon. As many  
14 folks probably know, New Jersey Audubon runs  
15 the world series of birding every year, which  
16 is coming up May 14. Registration is currently  
17 open for anyone interested. Anyone can  
18 participate and anyone can donate as part of  
19 the team or independently for this annual fund  
20 raiser. Ørsted participates as a funder, but  
21 no donor to the world series of birding who is  
22 an individual, foundation, or corporation has  
23 any influence whatsoever on our research or our  
24 efficacy. I just wanted to clarify that.

25 Thank you.

1 MR. BELNIAK: Looking back in our queue,  
2 again bear with me for just one moment.

3 Carla Joyce, I believe, touched on this  
4 before but let's read it into the record again.  
5 Carla Joyce comments: What happens once the  
6 answers to the questions presented here tonight  
7 are posted? Will there be a discussion with  
8 the community? And will the community have any  
9 say in the project going forward?

10 Next is from E Tedala again. Is there a  
11 public meeting scheduled with the appropriate  
12 regulators where residents can voice their  
13 opinions and get answers?

14 Here's a question posted just a few  
15 minutes ago. My apologies, Alvaro. Alvaro is  
16 the next commenter. I missed it before. The  
17 comment is only 5 minutes fresh, so hopefully,  
18 Alvaro, you're still with us.

19 Alvaro comments: This will be Governor  
20 Murphy's Flint, Michigan. The dollars paid to  
21 OCNJ will not cover the additional liability.  
22 What is the limitation of liability in the  
23 insurance policy purchased by Ocean Wind during  
24 the ongoing operations?

25 Robert Moss again. Robert had several

1           comments. I'm just trying to intersperse them  
2           throughout others. Robert comments: Were any  
3           private parcels considered, if so, why not? I  
4           can't look up if the block numbers as we speak.  
5           I can't work that fast. Anyway available in  
6           the regulations does not mean not currently for  
7           sale. Eminent domain can be used. Your  
8           proposal is the latest in a line of abuses of  
9           the Green Acres alternatives process same as  
10          the rollercoaster in Seaside Heights. The  
11          renegade Green Acres staff allows applicants to  
12          do what you're doing. Effectively, that means  
13          Green Acres plans will be the easiest route as  
14          opposed to the only available route. If this  
15          keeps up, all our public open space, supposedly  
16          preserved forever, as the sign proclaims in the  
17          DEP office in Trenton, will be gone in 10 or at  
18          most 20 years.

19                 Cindi Sutera comments again. I also  
20                 resent a foreign company being involved in any  
21                 supposed improvement to our city.

22                 Kathy Ingham comments: If this project  
23                 moves forward, which I hope it does not, when  
24                 with the windmills be obsolete, as in end of  
25                 life, and when will they be removed?

1           Robert, I do see your hand raised. I'll  
2 get to you in just a moment.

3           Gianna Marrese just offers up her website  
4 again, ProtectOurCoastlineNJ.com.

5           I will flip over to Dave Roberts once  
6 more. Dave, just as before, I'm going to send  
7 the command to open your mic. You can get a  
8 fresh 3 minutes to share any comments related  
9 to the project at hand this evening.

10           MR. ROBERTS: Hi, it's not so much a point  
11 of what we're going to see from the beach, but  
12 what are our kids going to see from the beach  
13 or our grandchildren going to see from the  
14 beach? Are they going to be looking out at  
15 these towers of might that are decaying down  
16 the road?

17           MR. BELNIAK: Is that it, Dave?

18           MR. ROBERTS: Yes.

19           MR. BELNIAK: You ended abruptly. I just  
20 wanted to make sure you didn't get cut off.

21           We'll go to the hands. There are no hands  
22 raised. The remaining comments I see in the  
23 text at the moment are all people who have  
24 commented once, maybe two to three times.

25           What I'll do, with permission from the

1 project team here, is I'll read the balance of  
2 those comments into the record, and then we'll  
3 close out the hearing, and then we'll again  
4 re-share the next steps and ways to follow  
5 along with the project.

6 With that, start with Robert Moss. Robert  
7 comments: The previous speaker, although wrong  
8 about -- not previous now, previous earlier --  
9 the previous speaker, although wrong about  
10 climate change and global warming generally  
11 did, in fact, address the diversion. He's  
12 saying it's not necessary and therefore there's  
13 no compelling need.

14 Jumping down to Susan Ruse from earlier.  
15 A request from Ørsted to add a night shot to  
16 their simulation on the website that was  
17 previously mentioned. I understand there will  
18 be lights on every windmill. It would be very  
19 illuminating to have that photo posted.

20 Suzan commented just a moment ago. Suzan,  
21 thank you. I believe I may have misspoken.  
22 The website is ProtectOurCoastNJ.com, not  
23 coastline. So, ProtectOurCoastNJ is the  
24 website that's being referenced.

25 One more from Robert. Just commenting

1 brava to the current speaker. That was from  
2 previously. And another one from Robert.  
3 Comments about the adverse effects of the wind  
4 farm are directly related to the diversion  
5 because the application assumes no adverse  
6 effects.

7 Scanning once more. From Robert Zuczek  
8 again. I'm sorry if I'm saying the name wrong.  
9 I'm trying. More of a response than a question  
10 to the representative from Audubon society  
11 defending their taking money from Ørsted. And  
12 that is we all know money talks and the and she  
13 can fill in the rest.

14 Kathy Ingham comments: Will there be  
15 flashing red lights on the windmills at night?

16 I'm looking. No hands raised. We've got  
17 two comments left, two text-based comments left  
18 from Robert. Robert comments: It was  
19 referenced to something else that was being  
20 said. So, for example, N.J.A.C.7:36-26.1 E2,  
21 that's for the benefit of our court reporter,  
22 provides that there must be no significant  
23 adverse impacts including cumulative and  
24 secondary impacts on the public's use and  
25 enjoyment of parkland.

1           The visual impact from the shore of the  
2 wind farm is definitely an adverse impact.  
3 Stop criticizing those who bring up the adverse  
4 impacts to solar.

5           And no hands raised.

6           Last comment I see at the moment is once  
7 again from Robert Moss. Robert comments:  
8 Adverse impacts have everything to do with the  
9 Green Acres diversion and I've already cited  
10 the regulations to that effect.

11           With that, our comment queue is now  
12 cleared. And so, I'm going to turn the  
13 speaking role back over to someone other than  
14 me. So, I will look to either Katharine or  
15 Pilar to carry us out through the rest of the  
16 evening.

17           MS. PERRY: Thank you, Alan. And thank  
18 you sincerely to all members of public that  
19 have joined this scoping hearing with us here  
20 tonight. We understand the time that you've  
21 taken away from what you would've otherwise  
22 been doing and we are grateful to receive all  
23 of the public comments this evening.

24           So, just to reiterate, you can continue  
25 providing written comments. The information on



1           how to do so was included in the chat. Alan,  
2           if you could go back one slide for just a  
3           moment to 17. Again, this is how you can  
4           continue providing written comments. Those  
5           comments need to be submitted by March 21.  
6           Following the close of the public comment  
7           period, we will be preparing a response to  
8           comments document. That information will be  
9           included in our Green Acres diversion  
10          application. It will also be posted to the  
11          website. That is [www.OceanWind.com](http://www.OceanWind.com).

12                   And, again, tomorrow, this is PowerPoint  
13          presentation will be up and available online  
14          for you to review as well.

15                   Again, thank you all so much for your  
16          participation and engagement this evening. We  
17          look forward to continuing to work with you all  
18          as we move forward.

19                   Good evening, all.

20                   MR. BELNIAK: Thank you.
